

Process of Election: Bishop

The process of electing a Bishop is set out in the Bylaws (Part V) and may be found in Section B – Working Together at Convention.

The election of a Bishop proceeds without oral nominations. If the first ballot does not result in election, it is considered a nominating ballot. All elections shall be by secret ballot.

The following chart is designed to illustrate those bylaws in a schematic form for easy reference.

Ballot	Names on Ballot	Information Provided	Votes Needed to Elect
1 st (or nominating)	Blank	Nomination for bishop shall be made by secret ballot without oral nomination and shall be limited to those who are qualified to be on the roster of ordained ministers of this Church.	3/4 majority of votes cast.
2 nd	All names written on the first ballot	List of those nominated on first ballot.	2/3 majority of votes cast.
3rd	The four persons who received the highest vote on the second ballot.	Candidates provide Biographical forms	Majority of votes cast.
4 th	The three persons who received the highest vote on the third ballot.	Candidates address the assembly.	Majority of votes cast.
5 th	The two persons who received the highest vote on the fourth ballot.	Candidates respond to questions from convention delegates.	Majority of votes cast.

The result of each ballot in every election shall be announced to the convention.

SECTION B—WORKING TOGETHER AT CONVENTION

This section is primarily background reference for various aspects of our work together. For example, it offers examples of how to use **Bourinot's** Rules of Order; provides membership lists for the convention committees who are appointed to oversee such things as the accuracy of the minutes, the validity of resolutions, or the attendance figures; and sites the articles of the Synod Constitution and parts of the Synod Bylaws which will be useful when discussing the amendments proposed.

Summary of Bourinot's Rules of Order

GENERAL PRINCIPLES

- 1. Proper opportunity is afforded to all concerned for an expression of opinion.
- 2. Rights of a minority are respected.
- 3. Clear decisions are reached.
- 4. Proceedings are governed by an assessment of the issues rather than by personality factors.

MOTIONS

- 1. When properly presented before the meeting a motion may be withdrawn by its mover and seconder only with the assent of the meeting as a whole.
- 2. A question once decided cannot be brought up again at the same sitting. If it should be necessary to rescind a motion that has been passed, notice of intention in writing can be given at one sitting and dealt with at the next sitting. In the case of a motion that has been defeated, a motion to reconsider, requiring a two-thirds majority vote, can be introduced by giving notice in writing at one sitting for decision at a later sitting. Alternatively, another motion similar to the defeated motion but differing in some particulars may be introduced at the discretion of the chair.

AMENDMENTS

- An amending motion must be strictly relevant to the main motion. It must not alter in a material way the principle embodied in the main motion but should merely vary its terms in one or more particulars.
- 2. An amendment may be moved to the amendment. It must not materially alter the underlying intent of either the original amendment or the main motion.

3. If a member wishes to make an amendment, but it is not in order at the time in view of the fact that two amendments are already before the meeting, notice of the amendment may be given, as this proposal might affect the vote on the amendments awaiting decision.

SPECIAL MOTIONS

- 1. Motion to adjourn debate or sitting must be seconded and voted immediately. It is not debatable.
- 2. Proceeding to next business must be seconded and voted immediately. It is not debatable.
- 3. A motion "that the debate be closed and a vote be taken on the motion":
 - i. must be moved by someone who has not spoken in the debate;
 - ii. must be seconded:
 - iii. is not debatable:
 - iv. and requires a two-thirds majority of votes cast.

This motion should be used in place of motions to "call for the question" or "move the previous question." The latter wordings cause confusion because they have different meanings and consequences in Canadian and U.S. usage, and although we follow Canadian rules of order (Bourinot), the common understanding of the latter wordings tends to follow U.S. usage.

4. Deferment. Motions to postpone to a specified time or indefinitely must be seconded and are not debatable nor amendable. The use of the phrase "to table" is not recommended as it has different meanings and consequences in Canadian and U.S. rules of order and is not understood the same way by everyone.

- Reference or Committal. A motion to refer to a standing or special committee must be seconded, may be amended and debated, but only with respect to the reference or committal, not on the main subject at issue.
- 6. Debatable and Non-Debatable Motions. Generally, the distinction is made that substantive issues on which there will obviously be varying opinions are open to debate, while those of a procedural nature are not.
- 7. Substitute Motion. A substitute motion cannot be made. If a delegate wishes, "notice of motion" may be given. This means that if the current question being debated is defeated, a different motion may then be introduced.

POINT OF ORDER

A point of order should be raised when the alleged irregularity occurs; it is not acceptable if other proceedings have intervened.

DEBATE

If you wish to speak to a question before the house, proceed to a microphone and wait to be recognized by the chair. Upon recognition please state your name and the congregation you represent before addressing the question.

If you are making a motion, please also prepare it in writing using the motion slip form in Section A.

Petitions

Petitions not directly related to matters on the agenda, may be considered by the convention. The petition should have an action component and be duly seconded before being referred to the elected secretary of the synod. The secretary will forward the petition to the Committee for Reference and Counsel. (See below for a description of the role of Reference and Counsel.)

If a petition is submitted to the Committee for Reference and Counsel during the Convention, then it must be delivered to that Committee before 9:00 a.m. on the Friday (last full day of business) of the Convention.

After the motion has been read to the convention, it becomes part of the minutes and is subject to debate. When a motion (original or amended) is adopted, it becomes a resolution; that is to say, it becomes the decision or determination of the assembly with the matter under consideration.

Committee for Reference and Counsel

The Committee for Reference and Counsel is the impartial, discerning mind of the Convention, who acts inclusively and pastorally to:

- facilitate the orderly presentation of petitions so that the voice of petitioners is heard;
- clarify petitions so that the intent of the petition is complete, accurate and properly worded;
- support the chair by assessing the petition for compliance with constitutions, bylaws, decisions of previous conventions.

Six people, three lay and three rostered, (four of whom shall be delegates), are appointed by the Bishop to receive and study petitions submitted to the Secretary of the Synod by congregations, conferences, Synod Council, committees, or delegates.

Some of the petitions will have been submitted early enough to be included in the Bulletin of Reports; those received after publishing deadline will be forwarded by the Secretary of the Synod to the Reference and Counsel as they are received.

The petitions, which come to Reference and Counsel properly moved and seconded, will be presented to the Assembly with one of the options outlined here.

The Committee for Reference and Counsel will present the petition:

- a. without recommendation, for decision by the assembly; or
- b. without recommendation (but amended with the consent of the petitioners, for additional information to add clarity; or

- with recommendation to the chairperson that the
 petition be ruled out of order for stated reasons (for
 example, what is being proposed is already in
 place, or is contrary to unalterable parts of the
 constitution); or
- d. refer to a specified committee or office for consideration or
- e. with a dilatory motion (that is, a 'housekeeping' motion that is not debatable or amendable) to:
 - i. defer to a specified later time; or
 - ii. defer indefinitely, if the petition is one that the assembly would want neither to pass nor to defeat; or
- f. with recommendation that the petition be referred to Synod Council if the petition was received too late during the convention for the Committee to complete its deliberations.

Committee for Reference and Counsel will also:

- recommend special orders for the hearing of representatives who are not on the approved agenda;
- grant or deny permission to distribute printed matter or other items to the Assembly; and
- assist the chairperson as the chairperson may request during the course of the convention.

Use of a standard petition form is required. It is designed to give focus and helpful direction in the development of a petition. This will be distributed to all congregations prior to Convention. Petitions must be submitted to Reference and Counsel by 9:00 a.m. on Friday of Convention. Those submitted after this deadline will not be brought before the assembly for consideration.

Synod of Alberta and the Territories Constitution Amended June, 2016

ARTICLE I - Name and Incorporation

Section 1. The name of the synod functioning under

this constitution shall be The Alberta Synod whose operating name shall be The Synod of Alberta and the Territories of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada.

Section 2. The synod shall be incorporated under the

laws of Alberta.

Section 3. The seal of the synod shall consist of a

cross encircled by the words "The Alberta Synod - Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada." The bishop shall have custody of the seal.

ARTICLE II - Territory

The Territory of this synod shall be the province of Alberta plus the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories, and Nunavut.

ARTICLE III - Confession of Faith

Section 1. This synod confesses the Triune God -

Father, Son and Holy Spirit - as the one true God. It proclaims the Father as Creator and Preserver; His Son, Jesus Christ, as Redeemer and Lord; and the Holy Spirit as

Regenerator and Sanctifier.

Section 2. This synod confesses that the Gospel is the

revelation of God's saving will and grace in Jesus Christ, which He imparts through Word and Sacrament. Through these means of grace, the Holy Spirit creates believers and unites them with their Lord and with one another in the fellowship of the

Holy Christian Church.

Section 3. This synod confesses the Scriptures of the

Old and New Testaments as the inspired Word of God, through which God still speaks, and as the only source of the **Church's doctrine and the authoritative** standard for the faith and life of the Church.

Section 4. This synod confesses the following symbols comprising the Book of Concord

symbols, comprising the Book of Concord of 1580, which it subscribes specifically as witnesses to the way in which the Holy Scriptures have been correctly understood and explained and confessed for the sake of

the Gospel, namely

- a. the Apostles', the Nicene, and the Athanasian Creeds as the chief confessions of the Christian faith:
- b. the Unaltered Augsburg Confession as its basic formulation of Christian doctrine:
- c. Luther's Small Catechism as a clear summary of Christian doctrine;
- d. the Apology of the Augsburg
 Confession, Luther's Large Catechism,
 the Smalcald Articles with the Treatise,
 and the Formula of Concord as further
 witnesses to the Unaltered Augsburg
 Confession.

ARTICLE IV - Mission

Section 1.

As the regional expression of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, in faithfulness to the Lord of the Church, this synod shall facilitate and advance the mission of this church within its territory.

Guided and empowered by the Holy Spirit, it shall carry out this mission by shepherding its congregations and ordained ministers, and by engaging in other forms of ministry which proclaim God's Word and serve to bring reconciliation to the world.

Section 2.

The mission of this church, as an expression of the universal church and as an instrument of the Holy Spirit, is to bring the Gospel of Jesus Christ to people in Canada and around the world through the proclamation of the Word and the administration of the Sacraments and through service in Christ's name.

ARTICLE V - Membership

Section 1.

The membership of the synod consists of member congregations. Baptized individuals who are members of a congregation ("baptized members") shall exercise their privileges and responsibilities through participation in the congregation in which they are members.

Section 2. The synod shall recognize those

congregations on its territory that are recognized by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and certified to it by the secretary of the church.

Section 3. Additional congregations may be recognized by the synod acting of

recognized by the synod acting on behalf of this church in the manner described in the constitution and bylaws of this church.

Section 4. The synod may revoke its recognition of any congregation in the manner described in the

congregation in the manner described in the constitution and bylaws of this Church.

ARTICLE VI - Congregations

Section 1. Constitutions

Every congregation which is recognized by this synod shall have a constitution which, in the judgment of the Synod Council, is in harmony with the constitution and bylaws of this Church and of the synod.

Section 2. Representation to ELCIC Conventions

Every parish not represented by an ordained minister shall elect a lay delegate to the convention of this Church. If a parish has more than eight hundred (800) baptized members two lay delegates shall be elected, unless a pastor of the parish has been chosen by the conference, in which case one lay delegate shall be elected.

Section 3. Representation to the Synod and

Conference Conventions
Every congregation of the synod shall
choose a delegate or delegates to represent
it at conventions of the synod and at
meetings of the conference to which the
congregation is assigned in accordance with
procedures as defined in the bylaws of the
synod. An alternate or alternates may act in
the stead of the delegate or delegates in the
event of their absence.

Section 4. Relation to Synod

The alignment of congregations in pastoral charges shall be subject to approval of Synod Council.

Section 5. Petitions

Congregations shall have the right to petition this synod, according to procedures set forth in the bylaws.

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Section 6. Solicitation of Funds

The approval of this Church or a convention of the synod or of its council shall be required for the solicitation of funds from congregations for institutions, agencies and causes of this Church.

Section 7. Provision of Pastors

When a pastor resigns, the congregational council shall receive the resignation, report it to the congregation and notify the bishop of the synod.

Section 8. Advice of the Bishop

In case of strife and division in a congregation, the congregational council shall seek the advice of the bishop of the synod.

Section 9. Appeals from Discipline

A lay member of any congregation, who is under discipline, may appeal to the synod. All such appeals must be in writing to the bishop within thirty (30) days after the disciplinary action has been taken. Copies of said appeal shall be transmitted by the appellant to the pastor and to the secretary of the congregation. The bishop shall appoint a special committee to investigate the appeal. The decision of the committee shall be final and reported to the appropriate parties.

Section 10. Procedures for Withdrawing

A congregation desiring to withdraw from this church shall notify the synod bishop. Decision to withdraw must be approved by a two-thirds majority vote at a legally called and conducted meeting and immediately reported to the synod bishop.

Decision to withdraw shall not be effective until action has been ratified by a two-thirds majority vote of those who were members at the time of the first vote. This subsequently legally called and conducted meeting held not less than 90 days and not more than 180 days after the first vote to withdraw.

Section 11. Co

Congregation Becoming Defunct
A congregation which has ceased to exist or whose membership has so diminished in numbers as to render it impossible or impractical for the congregation to function according to its constitution and bylaws shall, after consultation with any remaining

members, be deemed by the synod of which it was a part to be defunct. The synod through the Synod Council shall appoint trustees, including where feasible former members of the congregation, who shall take charge and control of the property of said congregation to hold, manage and convey the same on behalf of this synod.

ARTICLE VII - Ordained Ministers

Section 1. The synod shall have a roster of ordained ministers.

Section 2. The standards of acceptance and continuance on the roster of ordained ministers shall be defined in the bylaws of the synod.

Section 3. An ordained minister shall preach the Word, administer the Sacraments and conduct public worship in harmony with the faith and practices of the Church; shall baptize, confirm and marry in accordance with the teaching of the Church and with the laws of the province; shall visit the sick and distressed and bury the dead; shall inculcate piety in individual and family life and provide pastoral leadership to all schools and auxiliary organizations of the congregation; shall install members of the congregational council and, with the council, administer discipline; shall seek out and encourage qualified persons to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel and strive to extend the Kingdom of God in the community, at home and abroad; and shall encourage the members to be generous in support of the ministry of the congregation, the synod and the church.

ARTICLE VIII - Diaconal Ministers

Section 1. The synod shall have a roster of diaconal ministers.

Section 2. The standards of acceptance and continuance on the roster of diaconal ministers shall be defined in the bylaws of this synod.

ARTICLE IX - Full Communion Provisions

Section 1.

Ordered ministers of churches with which this church has a full communion agreement, who are serving in this church under the provisions of that full communion agreement, shall have the same rights and

privileges as the equivalent order of ministry in this church.

ARTICLE X - Conferences

Section 1. The synod shall be organized regionally into conferences whose members and boundaries shall be determined by the synod in convention upon the recommendation of the Synod Council.

Section 2. The role of the conferences shall be defined in the bylaws of the synod.

ARTICLE XI - Conventions

Section 1. The convention of the synod shall be its highest legislative authority.

Section 2. Conventions of this synod shall be held according to times, policies, and procedures as described in the bylaws of the synod.

ARTICLE XII - Synod Council

Section 1. Synod Council is the governing body of the synod and shall carry out all normal functions and responsibilities on behalf of the synod in accordance with the constitution, the bylaws and resolutions of the synod in convention.

Section 2. Synod Council shall consist of the officers of the synod, and members elected and appointed according to procedures defined in the bylaws of the synod. Synod Council may appoint a replacement member to fill a vacancy between conventions.

Section 3. The terms of the elected members shall begin the first day of the third month following election.

Section 4. The bishop shall be an ex officio member of Synod Council.

ARTICLE XIII - Officers

Section 1. The officers of the synod shall be the chairperson, the secretary and the treasurer. Two of the three officers shall be lay members of the synod.

Section 2. The duties of the officers shall be defined in the bylaws of the synod.

Section 3. The officers shall be elected by the synod convention according to procedures defined in the bylaws of the synod. All officers shall

serve until their successors assume office.

Section 4. Synod Council may appoint a replacement officer to fill a vacancy between conventions.

Section 5. The terms of officers shall begin no later than the first day of the third full month following election.

Section 6. The recall or dismissal of an officer of the synod shall follow the procedure set out in the constitution and bylaws of this church.

Section 7. Synod Council may extend a call to an assistant to an officer in accordance with procedures defined in the bylaws of the synod. Such persons shall be ineligible for membership on Synod Council.

ARTICLE XIV - The Office of the Bishop

Section 1. The bishop shall be a pastor and counsellor to all pastors and lay members of the synod, and with the Synod Council, shall be the guardian of the procedures relating to the good standing in the faith, and the welfare of congregations, pastors and institutions of the synod.

Section 2. The bishop shall be the chief executive officer of the synod, and an ex- officio member of all committees of the synod.

Section 3. The bishop, as the chief executive officer of the synod, has full authority, responsibility and accountability to discharge all duties and obligations of that office as mandated in the constitution, the bylaws and by resolution of Synod Council.

Section 4. The authority to elect and call a bishop shall rest with the synod at a regular convention or a special convention called for this purpose.

Synod Council shall seek the advice and counsel of the bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada in the call process.

Section 5. All synod staff and staff committees shall be accountable to the bishop.

The bishop may delegate responsibility to other staff as deemed appropriate.

ARTICLE XV - Committees

Section 1. Synod Council shall have authority to establish such committees deemed necessary for the mission of the synod.

ARTICLE XVI - Theological Institutions

Section 1.

This synod acknowledges its responsibility to maintain a theological seminary within the guidelines provided by this church, to strengthen this seminary spiritually and academically, and to provide for its financial support.

Section 2.

a. The Board of Governors of Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, shall control and manage the seminary and determine its academic and administrative affairs. The property of the seminary, both real and personal, shall be held by the Board of Governors in trust for and under the guidance of the British Columbia Synod, Alberta Synod, Saskatchewan Synod and Manitoba/Northwestern Ontario Synod.

- b. The board may, in consultation with the church, propose to the synod(s) an increase in the number of its members, such increase to include an equal number of ordained ministers and lay persons. Any proposal for increase in the number of members of the board must have the approval of the synod(s).
- c. The term of office for each member of the board shall be four years except in the following cases:
 - Where a member is appointed to fill a vacancy, such appointment shall be by the Synod Council and shall be for the remainder of the term of the predecessor.
 - ii. In the case of the first of any new elections in connection with increasing the number of the said board, the terms of office shall be for two or four years, so spaced that one-half of the membership of the board shall be elected each biennium.
- d. Members of the board shall be eligible to serve for not more than two consecutive terms.

- e. Financial support for the seminary shall be determined by a process of consultation between the Board of Governors, this Church and the Synod Council.
- f. The board shall make an annual report to the regular convention of the synod.

ARTICLE XVII - Auxiliaries

There shall be synodical units of the official auxiliaries of this church. Such units shall report to the Synod Council and conventions. The bishop, or an appointee, shall have seat and voice at synodical unit conventions and board meetings.

ARTICLE XVIII - Bylaws

Section 1.

This synod may adopt such bylaws, not in conflict with this constitution, as may be necessary. Such bylaws may be amended at any convention by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present and voting. At least one day shall elapse between first presentation and convention action unless unanimous consent to amend is given.

Section 2. Bylaws relating to convention procedure may be suspended by a two- thirds vote of the delegates present and voting.

ARTICLE XIX - Amendments

Section 1.

The Confession of Faith as stated in Article III shall be that of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and is not amendable.

Section 2. Amendments to this constitution shall be in writing and may be proposed by either a. the National Church Council

- b. the Synod Council,
- c. a congregation of the synod, or
- d. ten delegates

Section 3.

All proposed amendments must be reported to the convention no later than the first full day of business. The Synod Council shall make a report and recommendation during that convention on all proposed amendments. Adoption of an amendment shall require passage at this and the next regular convention by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present and voting. Notice of the full text thereof shall be sent to the

pastors and congregations of the synod at least one month prior to the second reading. Further amendment at the second reading shall require unanimous consent. Such amendments shall be effective upon ratification by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada in convention or by its National Church Council.

Synod of Alberta and the Territories Bylaws Amended June, 2016

Part I Headquarters (Constitution, Article II)

Section 1. The headquarters of this synod shall be located in Edmonton.

Section 2. All executive offices shall be located at the headquarters of the synod unless otherwise approved by the synod council.

Part II Organizational Relationships Section 1. Congregations (Constitution, Article VI)

- a. In relating to congregations within its territory, the synod shall organize, recognize, receive, release and exclude congregations, and approve or disapprove of the relocation or the merger of congregations.
- **b.** Congregations may petition the synod according to the procedures set forth in these bylaws, Part V, Section 8.

Section 2. Conferences (Constitution, Article IX)

The synod shall be divided into five conferences as follows: East Central, Northern, Southern, Southwestern and West Central.

- a. All members of the congregations are encouraged to attend conference meetings. The voting membership shall be all ordained ministers and diaconal ministers residing within the territory of the conference, and three lay delegates from each congregation, the third of whom shall be a confirmed member under the age of twenty-five. Congregations having more than three hundred baptized members shall be entitled to an additional lay member for each additional two hundred baptized members or major fraction thereof.
- b. The bishop of the synod or the bishop's appointee shall attend the conference meetings.
- **c.** The purpose of the conferences shall be to:
 - i. Assist its congregations and the synod in planning, promoting and implementing the mission of this Church;

- **ii.** Encourage fellowship among ordained and diaconal ministers and congregations;
- iii. Arrange opportunities for the study of the Bible and Lutheran confessions:
- iv. Respond in consultation with the synod to particular needs within its territory;
- Elect the required number of rostered ministers as delegates to the conventions of this Church; and
- vi. Elect representatives to synodical positions as determined in these bylaws.
- **d.** A conference may adopt for itself any rules and regulations not in conflict with the constitution and bylaws of the synod.
- e. Each conference shall meet at least once a year at a time and place set by the conference. Conferences shall designate their own quorums.
- f. Each conference shall have the right to petition the synod according to procedures set forth in these bylaws, Part V, Section 8.
- g. Each conference shall elect from its membership a dean, a chairperson, a secretary or secretary/treasurer, and at least one other person who shall constitute a conference council. The conference may elect a treasurer who shall be a member of the council, or the council may appoint a treasurer who shall not be a member of the council.
- h. The conference council shall appoint persons to fill all vacancies in the council membership until the next meeting of the conference. In the event of the resignation of a conference dean, an interim dean shall be appointed by the conference council in consultation with the bishop. Time of service completed in fulfilment of vacant conference council positions shall not be included for the purposes of determining eligibility for further election.
- i. The conference council shall be authorized to receive and hold funds from its member congregations for the purpose of defraying reasonable administrative or program expenses

- related to the work of the conference. A printed financial report shall be presented at all regular meetings of the conference.
- j. The dean of each conference shall report to the synod through the bishop.
- k. The deans of the conferences and the bishop shall meet at least once a year for spiritual renewal and for general discussion of programs, plans and problems affecting conferences and the synod. Except where otherwise provided in this constitution and its bylaws, the function of such a meeting shall be consultative and advisory.
- I. The bishop may call upon the deans of the conferences to assist in the duties of installations and pastoral care of the ministers and congregations in their conferences.

Section 3. Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (Constitution, Article V)

In relating to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, the synod shall:

a. Recognize where operating within the territory of the synod, all organizations recognized by the ELCIC, as provided for in the ELCIC Constitution, Article XVII, Section 3.

Section 4. Theological Institutions (Constitution, Article XV)

- a. The Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon is owned by the Synods of Manitoba/Northwestern Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Territories, and British Columbia. Its Board of Governors is made up of the bishops of those synods, a lay and clergy representative from each of those synods, and one clergy and two lay representatives appointed by this Church. Advisory members are the president of the Lutheran Theological Seminary and the national staff person assigned to relate to theological institutions.
- In relating to Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon, the synod in convention shall elect two members to the Lutheran Theological Seminary Board of Governors, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, one clergy and one lay, according to the terms determined by the seminary.

Part III Ordained Minister/Congregation Relationship (Constitution, Article VII)

- Section 1. Ordination of approved candidates shall take place at a time and place designated by the bishop.
- Section 2. The synod shall have a call process manual approved by the synod council. A congregation wishing to extend a call shall follow the general procedures set out in the call process manual unless otherwise advised by the bishop due to unusual circumstances.
- Section 3. A minister shall inform the congregational council and the bishop immediately upon receipt of a call to another ministry, and shall inform the calling agency and the bishop of any decision made within thirty days unless an extension is granted by mutual consent of all the parties involved. A minister shall terminate an existing call within two months of accepting another call, unless an extension is granted by mutual consent of all the parties involved.
- Section 4. If a conflict arises within a congregation that cannot be resolved internally, the pastor or the council chairperson shall notify the dean or the bishop in order that a mediation counsellor or other person with special expertise may be called in for the purpose of resolution and reconciliation. This process may be requested by the minister(s), the congregational council, or one guarter of the members in good standing of the congregation. Recommendations from the mediator shall be dealt with at a meeting of the congregation called for this purpose. If the conflict cannot be resolved satisfactorily by this process, the bishop shall be advised for follow up action.
- Section 5. When no term is specified, a regular call accepted by an ordained minister to a congregation shall constitute a relationship which may be terminated only for the following causes:
 - a. The resignation of the minister
 - b. The disqualification of the minister as a result of discipline

- The division of the pastoral charge
- d. The physical or mental incapacity of the minister
- e. The continued neglect of ministry by the minister
- f. The inability to conduct the ministerial office satisfactorily in a congregation in view of local conditions, without reflection on the moral and spiritual character of the minister.
 - i. In the last three contingencies, the bishop may, following consultation with the conference dean, appoint an advisory committee of two rostered ministers and two lay members to investigate. Upon the request of the congregational council or the rostered minister; or on receipt of a petition signed by at least one-third of the voting members of a congregation, the bishop shall appoint an advisory committee to investigate.
 - ii. The bishop may, with the concurrence of the congregational council, suspend the minister from ministerial duties pending the outcome of the formal proceedings when circumstances warrant.
 - iii. An advisory committee appointed to investigate an allegation of physical or mental disability shall secure medical testimony to confirm or refute such allegation. If incapacity is confirmed, the bishop may, on the advice of the committee and with the concurrence of the congregational council, declare the pastorate vacant. Should the minister be restored to health, the bishop shall take steps to enable the minister to resume ministry in the congregation last served or in another ministry.

- iv. An advisory committee appointed to investigate an allegation of neglect of ministry or of local conditions that imperil the well-being of a congregation shall provide an opportunity for all concerned parties to be heard. At the conclusion of the investigation, the bishop, in company with the committee, shall bring recommendations to the minister and the congregation for consideration and action. Such counsel shall be offered in Christian love and is not to be regarded as a disciplinary measure. If the situation cannot be resolved amicably, the pastor may resign, or the congregation may terminate the call by a majority vote at a properly called congregational meeting.
- v. The foregoing procedure shall not be invoked when questions of doctrine or morality are involved. Such cases shall be treated as disciplinary matters.
- Section 6. Between called ministers an interim minister shall be appointed by the bishop in consultation with the congregational council in accordance with procedures set forth in the call process manual. An interim minister shall have the rights and duties of a regularly called minister. An interim minister shall not be eligible for call to the congregation he or she is serving as interim. Interim or ministers providing occasional pulpit supply during an interim shall refrain from exerting influence in the call process.
- Section 7. A minister shall not preach or perform any ministerial act within the parish of another minister except at the latter's request or consent or visit or perform ministerial acts in a time of a ministerial vacancy, except by invitation of the interim minister or congregational council.
- Section 8. The minister shall ensure that the congregation keeps accurate records of membership, baptisms, confirmations, marriages, burials and communicants, and shall report such statistics annually to the

secretary of the Synod on the forms prescribed by the Church. These records shall be certified as being correct by the congregational secretary on the same forms. The congregational records shall be kept in a separate book which shall remain the property of the congregation.

- Section 9. When members move, the minister shall commend them to the ministerial care of the parish in which their new home is located.
- Section 10. All rostered ministers serving under call are expected to attend all conventions of the synod and the meetings of the conferences to which they belong.

Part IV Diaconal Ministers
(Constitution, Article VIII) (As defined by this Church)

Part V Conventions

(Constitution, Article X)

- Section 1. The regular conventions of the synod shall be held biennially between national conventions.
- Section 2. The secretary shall publish the time and place of each regular convention at least six months in advance. The secretary shall send out a bulletin of reports to all voting members at least thirty days before each regular convention.
- Section 3. The voting membership of conventions shall consist of:
 - a. One lay delegate from each congregation and, from congregations having more than three hundred (300) baptized members, one lay delegate for each additional two hundred (200) baptized members. A congregation is entitled to one extra voting delegate if that person is between the ages of 16 and 22 years as of December 31 of the convention year.
 - **b.** Ordained ministers on the roster of the synod;
 - **c.** Diaconal ministers on the roster of the synod; and

- d. All lay members of synod council.
- Section 4. At least sixty days prior to the opening day of the convention,
 - Each congregation shall submit the name(s) and address(es) of its lay delegates to the synod secretary, and
 - b. Each ordained and diaconal minister, active, non-parish, and retired, shall submit his/her name and address to the synod secretary.
- Section 5. One-third of the voting members shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 6. Seat and voice at conventions shall be granted to:
 - a. The bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada and such other official representatives of this Church as may be designated by the national church council,
 - b. Chairpersons of synodical committees in connection with their reports,
 - c. Representatives of institutions and agencies related to or officially recognized by the synod, and
 - d. The presidents of the synodical units of the official auxiliaries of this Church.
- Section 7. All arrangements for worship services or public meetings shall be made in consultation with the bishop.
- Section 8. Congregations and conferences may petition the synod in convention by submitting the petition in writing to the secretary of the synod for inclusion in the bulletin of reports. If the petition is too late for inclusion in the bulletin of reports, the secretary shall deliver the petition to the appropriate committee for presentation to the convention.
- Section 9. The synod council shall approve the convention budget which will include the participation of all delegates lay,

ordained and diaconal. Convention costs shall be shared among the congregations by dividing the total convention costs by the total number of confirmed members in the synod times the number of confirmed members last reported by each congregation.

Section 10. Special Conventions

- a. Special conventions for specified purposes shall be called by the chairperson of the synod within ninety days of receiving in writing a request for such a convention from:
 - i. The synod council by at least a two-thirds majority vote, or
 - ii. One-fifth of the congregations of the synod and one-fifth of the ordained ministers under call on its roster.
- The secretary shall give written notice of a special convention to each congregation, each ordained minister, and each diaconal minister, and shall publish the same at least thirty days prior to the opening date of the convention.
- c. The voting members at a special convention shall consist of:
 - i. The lay delegates who were seated in the preceding regular convention provided that they have not been disqualified by termination of membership in the congregation they represented. Vacancies in the lay delegates shall be filled by the congregations affected at a regular or specially called congregational meeting. Vacancies thus filled shall be reported to the secretary of the synod not less that five days before the special convention.
 - ii. Ordained ministers on the roster of the synod at the time of the special convention; and
 - iii. Diaconal ministers on the roster of the synod at the time of the special convention.

Section 11. Nominations and Elections (Constitution, Articles XI-XIV)

 a. The convention shall elect synod council members, officers of the synod, and the bishop in the following manner:

- The committee on nominations shall nominate at least two persons for each synod council position.
- ii. Additional nominations may be made from the floor for all positions except that of the bishop and the chairperson, with the prior consent of the person being nominated.
- iii. Synod council shall nominate the secretary and the treasurer. Nominations for chairperson shall be made by secret ballot without oral nomination. Nominations for two of the three synod officer positions shall be limited to lay persons.
- iv. Nomination for bishop shall be made by secret ballot without oral nomination and shall be limited to those who are qualified to be on the roster of ordained ministers of this Church.
- v. All elections shall be by secret ballot.
- vi. In all elections, except for the offices of the bishop and chairperson, a majority of the votes cast shall elect.
- vii. The election of the bishop and the chairperson shall be held on alternate convention years.
- viii. If an election does not occur on a first ballot for any position except that of the bishop and the chairperson, voting on a second ballot shall be limited to the two persons receiving the highest number of votes cast on the first ballot.
- ix. The election of the bishop and the chairperson shall be by secret ballot without oral nomination, and shall proceed in the following manner:
 - On the first ballot, three-fourths of the votes cast shall elect. If the first ballot does not result in an election, it shall be considered a nominating ballot. Thereafter, voting shall be limited to those persons named on the first ballot.
 - On the second ballot, two-thirds of the votes cast shall elect. If the second ballot does not result in an election, voting shall be limited to the four persons receiving the highest number of votes cast.

- On the third ballot, a majority of the votes cast shall elect. If the third ballot does not result in an election, voting shall be limited to the three persons receiving the highest number of votes cast.
- 4. On the fourth ballot, a majority of the votes cast shall elect. If the fourth ballot does not result in an election, voting shall be limited to the two persons receiving the highest number of votes cast.
- 5. On the fifth ballot, a majority of the votes cast shall elect.
- x. The result of each ballot in every election shall be announced to the convention.
- b. Election of synodical representatives to the Lutheran Theological Seminary shall proceed as follows:
 - The synod council, in consultation with the seminary, shall nominate one or more persons for each position for which election is required.
 - 2. Nominations may be made from the floor with the consent of those nominated.
 - Normally, nominations will be presented in such a way that representation alternates between male and female at the completion of an individual's term or terms.
 - 4. A majority of the votes cast shall elect. If an election does not occur on a first ballot, voting on a second ballot shall be limited to the two persons receiving the highest number of votes cast on the first ballot.
 - c. Eligibility for positions as synod officers, synod council members and synod representatives to the Lutheran Theological Seminary Board of Governors shall be limited to the confirmed membership of the member congregations of the synod and of those church bodies in shared ministry within the Synod with whom the

Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada is in full communion.

Section 12. The convention procedures shall be published in a convention manual approved by the synod council.

Part VI Nominations and Elections of Delegates to the National Church Convention (Constitution, Article VI, Sec. 2)

Section 1. Nominations for Delegates

- a. Six months in advance of a synod convention at which delegates to a national convention will be elected, the synod secretary shall call for nominations for lay, youth and rostered delegate positions. Nominations shall close 60 days prior to the opening of the convention at which the elections will take place. There will be no nominations from the floor for delegates to national convention during the convention.
- Complete information including nomination process, conference, congregational membership and biographical details must be received at the synod office 30 days prior to the opening of the convention for the nomination to be accepted. Nomination forms will be available through the synod office.
- c. Eligible nominees shall be:
 - rostered members who are members in good standing of a congregation within the existing conference boundary;
 - ii. lay members in good standing of a congregation;
 - iii. youth members in good standing of a congregation of the Synod who will be between the ages of 16 and 25 inclusive on the first full day of the next national convention.
- d. There shall be no restriction on the number of nominees who hold membership in any given congregation; however, congregations may only be represented by one delegate with the exception of youth delegates. In the event of an election of more than one delegate from a congregation, with the exception of youth delegates, the congregation's church council will be advised of the election following the

synod convention by the secretary of synod council. In consultation with the executive committee and/or the synod bishop and the **elected delegates the congregation's church** council will determine who will serve as delegate.

- e. Nominations for lay and youth delegates will be accepted within existing conference boundaries provided:
 - the nomination form is signed by 10 members in good standing of ABT synod congregations; or
 - the nominee is endorsed by either a congregational council or a general congregational meeting of a member congregation.
- f. Nominations for active rostered delegates will be accepted within existing conference boundaries provided:
 - i. the nomination form is signed by 10 members of good standing in ABT synod congregations; or
 - ii. the nominee is endorsed by either a congregational council or a general congregational meeting of a member congregation; or
- g. A list of all nominees and their biographies shall be published in the convention docket.

Section 2. Allocation of Lay, Rostered and Youth Delegates

- a. During Synod convention, delegates will elect two lay and one rostered national convention delegates from each of the synod's conferences. Two youth delegates shall be elected on an "at-large" basis without reference to a particular conference. If the allotted number of seventeen delegates are not elected during synod convention for any reason, the synod council shall appoint the necessary number lay, rostered or youth delegate(s) at its next regularly scheduled meeting.
- Synod council shall appoint any remaining lay and/or rostered delegates at its next regularly scheduled meeting to meet the total number of delegates eligible to attend national convention

- as allotted by the ELCIC. These appointments will seek to reflect a balance of gender, geographical and diaconal/ordained minister representation.
- c. Elected lay, rostered and youth delegates are eligible to attend two, but not three, consecutive national conventions.

Section 3 Order of Election

Nominees (rostered, lay and youth) receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot from each conference shall be declared elected. Where multiple positions are being filled for any one delegate category, nominees shall be declared elected on the basis of the highest number of votes received on the first ballot. If necessary, second ballots shall be held to break ties.

Section 4. Replacement of Delegates

In cases where elected delegates are unable to attend the executive committee and synod bishop shall appoint a replacement. Whenever possible, the replacement shall be the nominee who received the next greatest number of votes during the balloting process at the relevant synod convention.

Part VII Synod Council (Constitution, Article XI)

Section 1. The elected membership of Synod Council shall consist of one ordained and one lay representative from each conference in the Synod.

Appointed membership shall consist of one representative of a full communion partner who is actively serving in that partner Church. This person shall have seat, voice and vote.

Members shall serve for four-year terms, with half of the terms expiring each biennium. No elected member is eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms.

Section 2. The synod council shall:

a. Plan, coordinate, supervise and evaluate the activities of the synod in carrying out its

- mission and ministry, including development of appropriate policies for synod council;
- **b.** Be the directors of the corporation and trustees for the synod;
- Elect executive staff if and when such positions are created by the synod in convention;
- **d.** Issue letters of call to rostered ministers who are full-time officers or staff officials of the synod, or who are called to special service;
- **e.** Fill vacancies until the next convention except as otherwise provided;
- f. Determine the fact of the incapacity of an officer of the synod according to the procedures in the constitution and bylaws of this Church;
- g. Approve candidates for call, ordination and admission to the rosters of ordained and diaconal ministers:
- **h.** Appoint all committees for which there is no other provision;
- i. Carry out duties in good faith with a reasonable degree of diligence, care, and skill;
- j. Expect the same standard of conduct from lay and rostered members;
- **k.** Make and enforce its own policies, including the discipline of its members; and
- Perform such additional duties as prescribed in the constitution, the bylaws, orby resolutions of the synod in convention.
- Section 3. The synod council shall appoint an ordained minister to assume the duties and responsibilities of the bishop in the event of the resignation, incapacity, or death of the bishop, pending the election of a new bishop at the next regular or specially called synod convention.
- Section 4. The synod council shall hold at least two meetings annually.
- Section 5. Special meetings of the synod council may be called by the bishop or chairperson of the synod when circumstances warrant.

Section 6. A majority of the members of the synod council shall constitute a quorum.

Part VIII Synod Officers (Constitution, Article XII)

Section 1. Officers of the Synod shall serve for a term of four years, without limitation.

Section 2. The chairperson of the synod shall:

- a. Convene and preside over conventions of the synod and meetings of the synod council, and
- b. Perform additional duties as prescribed in the synod council governance and policy manuals.
- Section 3. The secretary shall oversee all secretarial and record keeping duties on behalf of the synod as prescribed in these bylaws and in the synod council governance and policy manuals.

Section 4. The treasurer shall:

- a. Oversee all financial affairs and accounts of the synod, including deeds, mortgages, contracts, trust funds, investments, etc.,
- b. Be bonded under the fidelity coverage provided by the synod, and
- c. Perform additional duties as prescribed in the synod council governance and policy manuals.

Part IX Duties of the Bishop (Constitution, Article XIII)

Section 1. The bishop shall:

- a. Provide spiritual leadership and counsel to the synod, its conventions, and conferences;
- b. Ordain or consecrate approved candidates for rostered ministry;
- c. Oversee the call process as outlined in the call process manual;
- d. Attest to all official documents of the synod as may be required;
- e. Appoint the synod archivist/necrologist to maintain historical records on behalf of the synod;
- f. Discipline staff and program committee members in keeping with Biblical principles;

- Report to the synod council and the synod convention all significant matters affecting the mission and ministry of the synod; and
- h. Perform other duties as prescribed in the constitutions and bylaws of this Church and the synod, and the synod council governance and policy manuals.

Part X Synod Council Committees (Constitution, Article XIV)

Section 1. This synod shall participate in an Examining Committee serving the Synods of British Columbia, Alberta and the Territories, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba/Northwestern Ontario.

- a. The Synod Council of each synod shall appoint two lay persons and two rostered persons. Of the eight rostered persons appointed, at least one rostered person shall be a diaconal minister, with that position assigned to one of the synods by agreement of the synod bishops. Members shall be appointed to serve for a term of four years, with a limit of two consecutive terms, staggered so that no more than half are replaced at any one time.
- The President of Lutheran Theological Seminary shall annually appoint two faculty members.
- c. The synod bishops shall serve ex officio on the Examining Committee.
- d. It shall be the duty of this Committee to examine candidates for ordained and diaconal ministry and candidates for reception from other Lutheran churches with whom mutual recognition of ministry has not been established. The committee shall report its recommendations to the Synod Council of the Synod where the candidate is registered.
- e. Each examination shall be conducted by a subcommittee of the Examining Committee comprised of one faculty, two lay persons, two rostered persons, and the bishop of the candidate's synod. When a diaconal candidate is being examined, the sub-committee shall include a diaconal minister.
- f. Further terms of reference for, and procedures of, the Examining Committee shall be defined in the Candidacy Manual of this Church.

Section 2. The Committee for Theological Education and Leadership (Candidacy) shall be a standing committee of the synod council.

- a. The Committee for Theological Education and Leadership shall consist of eight members. Five of the members shall represent the conferences of the synod and shall be appointed by the synod council upon nomination by the conference councils. The other three members will be appointed by the synod council at large. Four of the committee members shall be lay persons, four shall be rostered. The synod bishop shall be an ex officio member. The committee will name its own chairperson and secretary.
- b. The appointed members shall serve for fouryear terms with a two consecutive term limit, staggered so that no more than half are replaced at any one time.
- c. It shall be the duty of this committee to select and endorse candidates for the ordained and diaconal ministry; review applications to the ministries of the synod by persons seeking readmission to the rosters of the synod; receive applications from candidates who come from Lutheran churches with whom mutual recognition of ministry has not yet been established, or who come from other churches; and refer candidates to the Examining Committee for colloquy according to the policies and procedures established by this Church.
- d. This committee shall receive applications for financial aid from ministry candidates and authorize the disbursement of synod funds designated for this purpose.

Section 3. The Congregation Constitutional Review Committee shall be a standing committee of the synod council.

- a. The Congregation Constitutional Review Committee shall consist of not less than three members and not more than five members appointed by the Synod Council, including the administrative coordinator from the synod office and one person from Synod Council who will serve as the chair.
- b. The appointed members shall serve for twoyear terms with a two consecutive term limit, staggered so that no more than one-half are replaced at any one time.

- c. The purpose of the Committee shall be to:
 - review congregations' constitutions and proposed amendments to ensure:
 - They do not conflict with the ELCIC or Alberta Synod Constitution or Bylaws;
 - They are based on the model constitution for congregations provided by the ELCIC for the guidance and practice of congregations within the ELCIC;
 - They provide consistency and clarity for congregational members in carrying out their ministerial and administrative duties and obligations including editing.
 - That differences in congregations and practices are recognized as acceptable in certain circumstances provided they do not conflict with the national and synodical governing documents.
 - ii. be available to confer and/or meet with a congregation or it's representatives to discuss proposed amendments and assist in helping the congregation make the amendments acceptable to Council examination.
 - iii. make recommendations to Synod Council regarding the Model Constitution for Congregations, its procedures and other related matters.
- d. The following principles will guide the work of the Committee:
 - Most reviews may be handled by mail (email) without the need for a face-to-face meeting.
 - ii. Committee members' responses should be forwarded to the synod office to the attention of the administrative coordinator.
 - iii. When there is a lack of consensus from the first round of Committee responses, then further communication will be solicited from the Committee.

- iv. If a proposed amendment from a congregation is unacceptable, and an understanding cannot be resolved by mail/phone call and negotiation, a real time meeting will be arranged that is mutually agreeable to the congregation and to most of the Committee members (this should occur infrequently).
- v. The Committee will then make recommendation to Synod Council through the appointed Council member, for approval or modification as deemed necessary.
- e. Approval, amendment or rejection must be based on the review criteria as stated above. The Committee only recommends the Synod Council approves, amends, or rejects.
- Section 4. Synod council may appoint other ad hoc committees for a specific purpose and duration as deemed necessary.

Part XI Ministry Committees (Constitution, Article XIV)

- Section 1. Synod Council may appoint ministry committees to help the synod meet its stated priorities.
- Section 2. Committee terms of reference and membership shall be determined by the Synod Council, with due attention given to clergy/lay, male/female, and regional representation. No person shall be a member of more than one committee, or a member of a committee and the Synod Council, at the same time.
- Section 3. Committees shall be accountable to the Synod Council through the office of bishop.

Section C – The Bishop's Office

The Bishop, as chief executive officer, has responsibility for the ministry and mission of this synod through the authority assigned to him/her in the Constitution (Article XIII); the Bylaws (Part IX) and the Synod Council governance policies.

Bishop's Report

2018 Synod Convention – Report of the Bishop Prepared April 19, 2018

Welcome to Convention. Welcome to the Seventeenth Biennial Convention of the Synod of Alberta and the Territories: *"Faith, Hope Love...the greatest of these is love"* (I Corinthians 13:13).

Synod Conventions offer delegates, guests and visitors a larger view of what it is to be church together. Along with the business sessions that necessarily require our attention we will gather in worship, we will explore the Scriptures together, we will explore our convention theme through three keynote addresses and table conversations, and there will be many opportunities to meet and engage in conversation with others from across our Synod.

I am thankful for the work of Convention Manager, Wendy Christensen-Grosfield, the worship planning team and our Convention Chaplain, The Rev. Jeff Decelle (Unity, Medicine Hat), and I am looking forward to introducing you to The Rev. Dr. Anna Madsen (http://omgcenter.com/about/) and to hear and learn from her engaging keynote addresses. Plans are underway to video, with Anna's gracious permission, her three keynote presentations which will be made available following Convention.

We will welcome and hear from our National Bishop Susan Johnson; also four guests from The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO); The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude, *En Missión con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador;* Lutheran Theological Seminary President, The Rev. Dr. Bill Harrison; LCBI; and CLWR Executive Director, Karin Achtelstetter.

In addition to our celebratory Opening Eucharist, other highlights include a Thursday evening Jazz Vespers including Healing Rite and Remembrance of Those Who Have Died, Friday and Saturday morning Eucharist with Dwelling in the Word facilitated by our Convention Chaplain and Keynote speaker, and a Saturday afternoon Sending service which will include the Installation of Council members and Seminary Representative and Blessing of the Synod Bishop.

Delegates, guests and visitors will have ample time to view the Display Tables of many Synod Ministry Teams (including a refreshment break featuring gelato prepared and served by the Synod Campus Ministry Team), National Church and CLWR, just to name a few, as well as plenty of opportunities for food and fellowship.

New this year: Registrants to the Convention are invited to register for Friday and Saturday "Lunch and Learn" events. Up to 25 registrants will meet in identified rooms for lunch and further conversation with: National Bishop Susan Johnson on ELCIC Global Mission, President Bill Harrison from Lutheran Theological Seminary, The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude, our guests from Colombia, CLWR, and Jeff Pym with ELFEC (Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada). All other registrants will have their lunch in the cafeteria.

Also new for this Convention was an invitation for submissions of artwork to be displayed in the assembly hall, reflecting the theme of the convention. Thanks to each contributor. I am looking forward to walking through the art gallery.

Throughout the Convention as you worship, listen, pray, discern and share stories I invite you to write your thoughts to the following two statements on sticky notes and to post them to the large print paper in the convention hall: "I am hearing God say to us...", and, "I sense that one of the places the Spirit is inviting our Synod to join with God in God's work is..." These will be gathered and reviewed for action at the September 2018 retreat of Synod Council.

As we gather from across our Synod it is my prayer that together we will be open to the Spirit's work among us...shaping...transforming...reworking...guiding...and that we will know the reality of the words of Paul to the church in Rome (15:13): "The God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."

The Synod of Alberta and the Territories. We are a very different Synod than when I was elected Synod Bishop in October 2012 and ordained in January 2013. Yes, we continue to be challenged with several realities not unique to our Synod nor to our denomination: a growing reality that there are too few candidates for congregational ministry, congregations struggling to provide financially for full or part-time ministries, shrinking worship participation, shrinking budgets, a need for faith formation and discipleship. I know that you share these realities, and others, with me. However, decline in participation or financial support does not mean God's purpose/mission for the church has changed.

My experience these past years is that the people and ministries across our Synod are rising to the challenge, seeking to join God in God's mission, which involves much intentional listening and shared discernment and experimentation and risk-taking. Across our Synod we have intentionally focused on missional formation, not as a program, but as a way of living.

As you know I was privileged to serve as one of four ELCIC delegates to the 12th Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation in Windhoek, Namibia. Together with delegates, staff, visitors, and ecumenical guests we numbered over 800 from 98 countries of the world representing 45-member churches and 74 million Lutherans.

While at the Assembly, we learned of the Namibian government's introduction of a development plan called the Harambee Prosperity Plan. The Kiswahili word Harambee means, "pull together in the same direction" and the development plan, therefore, is a "call for unity" encouraging Namibians to work towards a common purpose.

This understanding of Harambee...of pulling together in the same direction...gave me a new language and a renewed perspective on what we are seeing in our Synod...a pulling together in the same direction as we participate in God's mission. "A coming together" which is, interestingly, the meaning of the word, "synod".

This excites me; this "coming together" ...this "pulling together in the same direction" ...reaching out beyond the church walls, and asking where is God at work? And, how we might join God in God's mission?

So where are we headed? With change as a constant for the church and for society, what might our Synod look like in the future?

What if we took seriously the equipping and empowering of all – youth, child, adult – lay and rostered? Where gifts are identified and nurtured? And where leadership opportunities

on Synod Council or in Area Leadership Teams are created and offered to youth and young adults?

Imagine creating cohorts of learning – of intentional faith formation, discipleship building, service, discernment, and partnership with one's neighbor, including preparation for rostered leadership.

What would it look like for more youth and adults to participate in a pilgrimage of learning with our partner synod in Colombia, or El Salvador, or with first nations communities?

Imagine in our Synod an openness to collaborative ministries – with a neighboring Lutheran or Anglican congregation – where resources and gifts are shared for the common good. Where a team of lay and rostered leaders are trained and equipped to serve with and among several communities.

Imagine our Synod with every college and university campus from Whitehorse to Lac La Biche to Red Deer served by a Lutheran or ecumenical chaplain.

With the world at our doorstep, literally, what is the role of the church, where today's immigrants and refugees are seeking community, education and a home? Imagine creating specialized ministries with and among this growing ethnic diversity, and the grace-filled welcome to existing faith communities.

What if we lived our call as stewards of creation by resourcing our buildings both in greening the building and in offering space for community gatherings, forums, events – public space safe for dialogue, debate, and inquiry?

Together, we are the Church – sign, symbol and foretaste of the Kingdom of God. Synod: "Coming together." Harambee: "pulling together in the same direction."

Together, we live in vibrant witness to God's work in the world, offering our hands and feet in the service of God's mission.

Synod Staff – With Gratitude. It is a privilege to work with and among gifted and committed staff. A mere, "thank you," hardly expresses my deep gratitude, but, "thank you."

The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow was called to serve as Assistant to the Bishop for Mission and began August 1, 2013. **Julianne's primary focus, and passion, is missional formation.** She continues to facilitate and model for us all a culture of discernment, experimentation, discovery, wondering and reflecting.

Darla Wildfang, Executive Assistant, is the voice you hear when you contact the Synod Office. Her administrative abilities

and a passion for discovering and experimenting has led to significant contributions in use of technology; for example, jot forms for registration purposes for various events and workshops, and the preparation of our weekly e-newsletter *Wednesday's Word*.

Sheryl Burry, Synod Bookkeeper, began her service to the Synod on April 1, 2016 and her time at the Synod Office was increased in 2017 to provide some additional administrative support. She is now often the voice you hear when you contact the Synod Office. Sheryl has stepped into her position and its increased responsibilities with enthusiasm.

As you know there has been significant grief just within the Synod Staff. I thank you for your continued prayers. Sheryl has experienced the death of her father-in-law. Julianne's father died last year, and she is currently on a gradual return to work from a medical leave which began in February 2018. With Darla Wildfang and her family, we continue to grieve the death of Stephen. Darla currently continues a Compassionate Care Leave.

I am thankful for your patience and understanding as staff capacity has been greatly reduced these past months and will continue to be reduced for several months. Thank you to Anna Kochendorfer for providing part-time administrative support March and April, and to Cathy Kochendorfer who will be providing part-time administrative support in the month of May. Colleen McGinnis has, since Darla's leave, updated and published our Synod's e-newsletter Wednesday's Word. And as much as possible I have sought to reduce time away from the Synod in order to be present and available to all.

Wendy Christensen-Grosfield, in addition to serving as Convention Manager, serves as our Synod's Canada Lutheran editor. I appreciate Wendy's wonderful gift of connecting with people and ministries across our Synod and of word crafting.

The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude serves as program staff through our **Synod's** *En Missión con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador*, sharing gifts of hospitality, community and grace. I am pleased that Brian will be with us for the 2018 Synod Convention and available following the Convention through to July 1 for speaking engagements throughout the Synod. I am thankful for the ministry that Bishop Don Sjoberg (ret.) continues to provide *gratis* with regard to congregational dissolution and properties. He assists the Synod Office and congregations as Consultant Related to Church Property and Dissolution of Congregations.

The Synod office continues to be challenged by requests, questions, documentation and management surrounding the ownership and care of cemeteries, particularly where congregations are defunct. Carl Sorensen has served as a consultant to the Synod office regarding cemeteries updating synod materials, gathering the materials into files and identifying where follow-up is needed. I appreciate his willingness to freely give of his time and energy and he has now completed this task (56 files with notes).

The Rev. Gary Nickel continues to serve as Synod Necrologist and Archivist and I appreciate his gifts of attention to detail and conscientiousness. Gary is available as a resource to your congregation regarding any matters related to archival materials and documents.

While at the 2018 Annual Study Conference I met with our Synod's Ecumenical Officers: The Rev. Daranne Harris (south) and Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken (north). They have completed their three-years terms and I am pleased to share that each has agreed to serve a 2nd three-year position. Together we reviewed and added to our Synod's Ecumenical Officer Terms of Reference. We also began a listing of all appointees which I have made to various ministries/networks. These are current as of March 2018; my apologies if I have missed someone. For your information these are: Ecumenical Officer North - Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken, LARC Dialog (Lutheran Anglican Roman Catholic Dialog) Edmonton - Marcus Busch, Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken and The Rev. Barbara Groote, Ronning Centre -Augustana Campuse, UofA, Camrose - The Rev. Markus Wilhelm, EDCC (Edmonton and District Council of Churches) Edmonton - The Rev. Ingrid Doerschel, Greater Edmonton Alliance - The Rev. Phil Penrod, Capital Region Interfaith Housing Initiative - The Rev. Kathie Schmitke, Edmonton "Our Common Ground" Committee - Dr. Andrea Wilhelm, Ecumenical Officer South - The Rev. Daranne Harris, Metro Alliance for the Common Good Calgary - The Rev. Dr. Phil Holck, Calgary Interfaith Council - The Rev. Dr. Kayko Driedger Hesslein, and Anglican Diocese of Calgary, Diocesan Council - The Rev. Dr. Christine Nojonen.

Synod Council.

Synod Council retreats. Synod Council continues to meet twice per year in a retreat-like setting, gathering Thursday evening for worship and community building, and then meeting Friday through mid-afternoon on Saturday. We have appreciated the facilities at Mulhurst Lutheran Camp, Pigeon Lake and Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake and the cooking of Cathy Kochendorfer for our retreats.

Synod Officers meetings. Between the Synod Council retreats the Synod Officers meet on a regular basis. We have

regularly met at the Synod Office in Edmonton occasionally skyping Synod Officers and Synod Staff in to the meeting.

Welcome to New Councillors and Officers. Following the 2016 Synod Convention we welcomed new councillors to Synod Council: Shae Belanger (East Central), The Rev. Dr. Deborah Ann Taylor (East Central), The Rev. John Lentz (West Central), Wendy Kalkan (Southern) and The Ven. Alan Perry (Anglican Diocese of Edmonton). We also welcomed a new Chair, Wayne Street, and together we facilitated an orientation for new councillors in September 2016.

In September 2017 we welcomed two new councillors: The Rev. Heidi Wachowiak (North) who was appointed to replace The Rev. Dr. Ann Salmon who had taken a position at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon; and, The Rev. Janice Whitelock (Southern) who was appointed to replace The Rev. Reg Berg who had taken a call to Prince of Faith, Calgary.

In March 2018 Synod Council appointed Paul Ellison, Synod Treasurer, to complete the term of Stephen Wildfang. I look forward to working with Paul in his role as Treasurer and to welcoming him and introducing him to you at Synod Convention.

Guests to the Synod Council retreats. It has been our regular practice to invite the Deans and the National Church Council Synod representatives to Synod Council meetings and to provide agenda time for a brief report from the National Church Council. The National Church Council Reps (through to the 2017 ELCIC National Convention) were Judy Wry (Holy Spirit, Edmonton); The Rev. Dr. Marc Jerry (Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer); and Les Pearson (Unity, Medicine Hat). Beginning with the adjustment of National Church Council members at the 2017 ELCIC National Convention, we now have two Synod Reps on National Church Council: The Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen, (Hosanna, Edmonton) and Les Pearson (Unity, Medicine Hat).

At the September 2016 retreat we welcomed The Rev. Dr. Alan Roxburgh of *The Missional Network*. In March 2017 and 2018 we welcomed National Bishop Susan Johnson who at the March 2017 retreat, in addition to reporting from National Church Council, facilitated a learning event around The Lutheran World Federation's, *Gender Justice Policy*.

At the March Synod Council retreats, beginning in 2016 following the work of the Truth & Reconciliation Commission's work, learning around Abiding in Right Relations has been shared. At the March 2017 retreat we welcomed Fiona Brownlee, Rural Indigenous Communities Liaison for the Anglican Diocese of Edmonton who shared of her ministry,

and in March 2018 Councillors and guests viewed and discussed the video *Reserve 107*, the story of how the Young Chippewayan First Nations Band initiated a gathering with the Lutheran and Mennonite settlers who had unknowingly settled on their reserve land. The video is available through the Synod office.

At the September 2017 retreat we welcomed Jeff Pym, an ELCIC member and director of ELFEC (Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada), a Lutheran Foundation with a three-fold mission: to help congregations manage and grow investments, to help individuals leave gifts to the church, and to grant money to Lutheran charities and other church-related projects. You can find more about ELFEC here: https://elfec.ca/about-us. Jeff will be with us for the 2018 Synod Convention.

MISSION PRIORITIES

1. Spirit-Led Leadership:

Forming Missional Shaped Ministries. Our Synod continues its intentional work of exploring, developing and supporting skills and capacities for moving into God's planned future following the leading of the Holy Spirit. Congregations and ministries are invited to join in God's work in their local contexts. On this journey of listening, discerning, experimenting, reflecting and learning, rostered and lay leaders are gaining new skills and beginning to cultivate a learning community culture within their congregations and ministries.

A brief summary: Throughout the Synod, congregational leaders, both lay and rostered, participated in the first iteration of *The Missional Network's* (TMN) process, under the direction of The Rev. Dr. Alan Roxburgh and his team. A second iteration began in the fall of 2015 in the Southern Area gathering regularly in Brooks. Eight pastors and six congregations participated. This iteration was facilitated by The Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, who shadowed TMN staff during the first iteration. Conversation began regarding a third iteration with a gathering of lay and rostered leaders at Scandia Lutheran, Armena. As a result, a third iteration began in the fall of 2016 in the Camrose-Wetaskiwin area.

Across the Synod awareness of missional formation practices continues to grow. There are thirteen congregations and twenty-four rostered leaders actively participating in the Missional Network action learning process. As well, current Creative Initiative experiments involve seven ministries and ten additional leaders. Other congregations are seeing God's work in their local contexts and are actively seeking to join God in God's work (a total of twenty ministries and thirty-four leaders).

We are supporting congregations and ministries in becoming learning communities where listening, discerning, experimenting, reflecting and learning are the norm for decision making and planning.

Modelling this rhythm, the Synod Council's 2015 and 2016 "Participating in Hope" events in sixteen area gatherings across the Synod focused on listening to the stories of God at work in and through the congregations as a first step of discerning next steps for the Synod. This was followed by Council's intentional listening at the 2016 Synod Convention, reflection together as a Synod Council on a presentation by The Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, *A Listening and Discerning Process – ABT Synod Council*, discernment together with The Rev. Dr. Alan Roxburgh at the September 2016 Synod Council Retreat, and further sharing and feedback from the fall 2016 area gatherings

As a Synod Council we continue to imagine and to grow into our Synod's mission priorities: Spirit-Led Leadership, Hope-Filled Discipleship, Innovative Tradition and Collaborative Partnerships. We are seeking to build relationships, to listen and to seek common areas for working together, and to discern our role and structure.

We continue to hear across our Synod the following four summary opportunities first articulated at the September 2016 Synod Council retreat, that:

- You are desiring connection and relationship to experience God's love among us all.
- You are eager to risk and test new ways but are concerned about how to do this and want to ensure we keep our essentials.
- You want practical help in discerning what God is up to because you sense God is at work and present in so many ways.
- This sense of God's acting presence is creating renewed desire to be communities of God's hopefilled people.

Area Leadership Teams (ALTs). In September of 2017, following nearly two years of listening, exploring, and discernment, Area Leadership Teams were appointed by Synod Council to a three-year term with input from the then conference councils in five geographical areas. Each Area Leadership Team is composed of five members: two rostered leaders (one of whom would be appointed Dean), two lay members and one youth. A treasurer may or may not be a member of the Area Leadership Team.

These leaders are gifted listeners, encouragers, natural leaders, and organizers. They are prayerful, flexible, thoughtful, collaborative and have a sense of humour. Twice a year, these teams will gather together with Greg Lingelbach

(First, Calgary), and The Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow to explore, develop and support skills and capacities to move into God's planned future in their Area, following the leading of the Holy Spirit. Over the next three years, these newly formed Area Leadership Teams (ALTs) will begin to cultivate a learning community culture and continue building relationships, to listen and to seek common situations for working together in their local Area.

The goals of Area Leadership Teams (ALTs) are to: develop a discerning, learning community within the area who seek to follow where God leads; strive to be an expression and catalyst of this synod's mission priorities in the area; encourage and equip congregations and ministries within the area to collaborate and implement the mission priorities of this synod; annually arrange, together with synod staff, for continuing education opportunities for rostered and lay leaders to support and encourage learning and collaborative area ministries: encourage networking and mutual support among rostered and lay leaders; provide pastoral support to area rostered ministers as required; maintain contact with the bishop of this synod; serve as the bishop's representative, as requested, at installations, assisting with the call process, and conducting exit interviews; and, provide recommendations to the bishop of this synod and synod council regarding the appointment of area leadership team members.

LWF Missional Consultation. In November 2016 The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, was one of two ELCIC delegates to the LWF Missional Consultation in Geneva. Her presentation on the North American context included learnings and wonderings:

- We are noticing that we (the church) are unclear about our distinct Lutheran identity and we wonder how to live into being "Lutheran" in our local contexts.
- We are noticing how, despite our best intentions, we are mired in a colonialist mindset and we wonder how to shift into an attitude of accompaniment.
- We have noticed our missiology of "doing for" keeps us in "control and power" and stymies authentic mission engagement. We wonder how to shift into doing "with" and being transformed by our neighbours.

2017 Annual Study Conference. Our keynote presenter at the 2017 annual study conference was The Rev. Dr. Dirk Lange, Associate Dean of Graduate Theological Education, Fredrik A. Schiotz Chair of Mission and Professor of Worship at Luther Seminary, St. Paul MN: Entering the Next 500 Years! The Reformation Today and Tomorrow. From Winnipeg, Dr. Lange's ministerial experience has covered a wide spectrum of activities, but all under one umbrella: liturgy in the lives of people. He has written extensively on topics in ecumenism and liturgical theology, including Trauma Recalled. Dirk Lange was Project Officer for the global Joint Commemoration of the

Reformation prepared by the Lutheran World Federation and Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity (Rome). He is also a member of the International Joint Lutheran-Catholic Dialogue Commission.

Our 2017 guest Bishop was The Rev. Dr. Sid Haugen from the SASK Synod, and the final morning included our recent practice of having those rostered leaders who have completed advanced degrees share their thesis in an ABT Synod TED (Theology Education Discipleship) Talk format. In 2017 we heard from The Rev. Dr. Kayko Driedger Hesslein, The Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen and The Rev. Dr. Marc Jerry. Chaplains were The Rev. Kathy Calkins and The Rev. Jeff Decelle.

2018 Annual Study Conference. Our keynote presenter at the 2018 annual study conference was The Rev. Dr. Allen Jorgenson, Professor of Systematic Theology and Assistant Dean, Waterloo Lutheran Seminary: *Exploring our Neighbor's Faith*. Allen is originally from Ponoka, AB. The theme of the conference intentionally grew out of the evolving multi-faith contexts for ministry acknowledged in "Encountering People of Other Faiths: Interfaith Guidelines" (ELCIC: 2017).

Our Conference guest was The Rev. Dr. William Harrison, President of Lutheran Theological Seminary, which provided opportunity for the new President to share formally and informally with those gathered.

The 2018 TED Talk presenters were The Rev. Dr. Tim Wray, Part-time Parish Pastor and Farmer; and The Rev. Mick Macintyre, Chaplain with the Canadian Forces. Chaplains were The Rev. Lindsey Jorgensen-Skakum and The Rev. Kirk Tastad.

Conference participants very much **appreciated this year's** ELCICGSI Lunch and Learn sessions with Lisa Thiessen and John Wolff, and the opportunity for free consultations with a registered dietician and/or a chair massage.

The Executive Officers approved funds from the Synod's Reserve Fund to significantly reduce the cost of the 2018 annual study conference for retired rostered leaders and their spouses. Evaluations indicate that this was appreciated by those who were retired and present. In 2017, only one retired rostered leader participated in the entire study conference. In comparison, ten retired rostered leaders and one spouse participated in the entire study conference in 2018.

Internship Placements. We give thanks for congregations and rostered leaders who have provided excellent internship supervision opportunities for

- Kate Zaiser, supervised by The Rev. Dr. Phil Holck, Lutheran Church of the Cross, Calgary,
- Seth Perry, a BC Synod candidate for ordained ministry, supervised by The Rev. Markus Wilhelm, Glory, Sherwood Park.

In addition, The Rev. Dr. Tim Wray and the congregation of Lutheran Church of the Master, Airdrie continue to provide pastoral support to Denis Sindano and his family, whose internship concluded prior to completion.

Synod Council approved partial funding of the internships in Olds, Leduc, Edson, Armena Parish and Airdrie from the Synod Reserve Fund.

- Jailyn Corbin, September 2, 2017 at Lord of Glory, Lac La Biche (Ordination and Installation) who began a First Call at Lord of Glory, Lac La Biche,
- Sarah Mowat, October 26, 2017 at Trinity, Whitehorse who began a First Call at Redeemer (shared ministry), Biggar, SASK.

Together with the whole Church we welcome Erik, Lindsey, Colin, Bev, Jailyn and Sarah to the Office of Word and Sacrament.

First Call Program. The First Call Program is one of the highlights of the year for the four western bishops. All newly rostered ministers (ordained or diaconal) are required to participate for the first three years of their first call. In addition to working with a mentor on a regular basis as well as attending to some reading requirements, the primary event is a four-day gathering each October. The venue rotates from

synod to synod each year, except that the BC Synod has been asked to host every third year in order that the participants and the other bishops might be able to enjoy an October in Victoria!! The learning sessions and case studies are deep and enriching, and the conversations throughout the week are life-giving.

Conference of Deans. Meetings occur three times per year prior to the Synod Council retreats and preceding the Annual Study Conference. The Deans, together with the Assistant to the Bishop for Mission and I, review plans for fall gatherings, engage in continuing conversation related to the transition to Area Leadership Teams within existing geographical conference areas, reviewed matters while I was on Sabbatical, share concerns related to rostered leaders and/or congregations, and much more.

Thank you to those who have served as Deans, to their families and congregations: The Rev. Eleanor Ness, The Rev. Reg Berg, The Rev. Kristian Wold; and those currently serving: The Rev. Trish Schmermund, The Rev. Jeff Decelle, The Rev. Kevin Powell, The Rev. Kathy Calkins and The Rev. Julianna Wehrfritz-Hanson.

Diaconal Ministers Gathering. An annual gathering of Diaconal Ministers from across our Synod takes place in the spring of each year, hosted at the Synod Office. Our time together includes worship, prayer, reflection, and education. In 2017 our time together included a presentation by Dr. Julien Hammond, Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Officer, Roman Catholic Diocese of Edmonton, *Reformation 500 from a Roman Catholic Perspective*. A 2018 gathering did not take place due to reduced staffing capacity.

Synod Campus Ministry. The Synod Campus Ministry Team continues to provide resources via Canada Post and the Synod's website annually for the *Drive* for *Five* fundraising event. The event has been renamed (since we are now on more than five campuses in Alberta) the SMART (Synod Missional Academic Response Team) Sunday. Thank you for your support for Campus Ministry through this annual initiative. After many years of review and consideration the Synod's Campus Ministry Team's Terms of Reference/Manual were presented to and approved by Synod Council in September 2016.

Candidacy Committee. The Synod's Candidacy Committee (formerly CTEL) meets three times each year. At the fall retreat, in addition to worship, to Developmental Interviews for candidates for ministry, and candidates one on one conversation with me, our learning component in 2016 focused on the ELCIC' Faith, Order and Doctrine's Study, "To Love Our Neighbors as Ourselves: A Study of Orders of Ministry in the ELCIC," which was facilitated by The Rev. Dr. Marc Jerry.

In 2017 our learning component focused on the ELCIC Study Guide on Medical Assistance in Dying facilitated by Diaconal Minister Karen Wedman and The Rev. Dale Olson from the Good Samaritan Society.

We continue to give thanks for significant Financial Aid provided to our Synod's candidates for ministry from the Synod's Support our Students Fund and The Stephen P. Kristenson Endowment.

In September 2016 \$17,000 was granted; in February 2017 \$7400 was granted; in September 2017 \$10,000 was granted; and in February 2018 \$8000 was granted.

In addition, funds from the Synod's Support our Students Fund have been made available for counseling services for ministry candidates.

Western Synods - Development of Lay Academy. The four western Synods and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon, are working together toward the development of a Lay Academy. Ron Schlegelmich (Holy Spirit, Edmonton) continues to represent our Synod. In the fall of 2017 the four western Synod Bishops participated in the Lay Academy by reflecting together on the lectionary texts for Advent 2017. I enjoyed this opportunity very much, as well as the November 18, 2017 live conversation around the texts for Advent 1 and 2, together with Bishop Elaine Sauer.

I believe that the development of the Lay Academy is vitally important as the church undergoes a shift in its human resources over the coming decades. Congregations are becoming smaller, which means that fewer of them will be able to financially support a full-time pastor. As a result, more and more rostered leaders will likely be serving multi-point parishes. The means that there will be a shift in the role of rostered leaders and the way in which congregations relate to one another. As a result, there needs to be an increased emphasis on lay education and training, so that these lay leaders may work in consort with the rostered leader. Such a shift also provides us with another opportunity to imagine, frame, and implement another way of being church. Some funds received by our Synod through the National Creative Mission Initiatives have been designated for two years for the Lay Academy.

Annual Synod Retired Rostered Leaders and Spouses Gathering. An Annual gathering for retired rostered leaders and spouses, widows, and widowers, takes place at Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake. I have an opportunity to share with those gathered highlights and events within our Synod, and to respond to questions and concerns. Our time together has usually included a time of learning and reflection. In 2017, The Rev. Dr. Kayko Dreidger Hesslein shared on the theme of *Reformation 500*. By the time of the 2018 Synod Convention the Synod will have hosted six gatherings with this year's event

held at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer. This is a wonderful day of conversation, food prepared by Cathy Kochendorfer, and worship.

Annual Open House. Cathy and I are pleased to welcome rostered leaders and their families to our home for an annual open house. The gathering is always rich in conversation, laughter and community building. And we love having guests in our home...so do our two dogs.

The Synod of Alberta and the Territories Stephen D. Wildfang Leadership Award. In recognition of the 500th Commemoration of the Reformation, and paralleling a similar national award within the ELCIC, Synod Council approved an Award recognizing an individual within the Synod committed to advancing the mission, mission priorities, and ministries of our Synod. Synod Officers are tasked with reviewing all nominations, creating a shortlist to bring to the spring meeting of Synod Council prior to a Synod Convention and to bring a recommendation to the Synod Council. Several submissions were received, and Synod Council approved the Executive Officers' recommendation of the first recipient. At the March 2018 meeting of Synod Council, a motion to rename the Award was also unanimously approved. At this year's Synod Convention banquet, Allyn Langager, a lay leader at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Lethbridge, will be honoured as the first recipient of The Synod of Alberta and the Territories Stephen D. Wildfang Leadership Award.

2. Hope-Filled Discipleship:

Synod Youth Gathering – Freely Given. In collaboration with our Lutheran Bible Camps a Synod Youth Gathering was held May 5-7, 2017 at Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake with forty-seven youth participating (sixty-four participated which included home team leaders, staff and planning team). The gathering theme reflected the 500th Commemoration of the Reformation. The keynote presentations by The Rev. Richard Reimer, drama and Sunday preacher Jacob Rempel, workshops, and the ministry of the gathering band affirmed the theme. Thank you to those who planned the Gathering, particularly the Synod's Youth Ministry Team chair, Tammy Kirkwood, and planning team: The Rev. Erik Sorenson, Krystle Plant, Wayne Hoff, Kyra VanVeen and from Camp Kuriakos: Kendra Freeland and Paul Kopjar. A 2019 Synod Youth Gathering is being planned to be held, May 3-5, 2019 at Hastings Lake Bible Camp.

CLAY 2016 – *Not for Sale.* An ABT Synod pre-gathering bus trip involved worship, site-seeing, community building and a whole lot of fun! Cathy and I were privileged to participate in the bus trip and then to participate at the CLAY gathering in Charlottetown, PEI. We are looking forward to

the ABT Synod pre-gathering bus trip to CLAY 2018 "Threads" in Thunder Bay, Ontario.

Camp Ministry. The Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, participated in the 2016 joint annual training for staff from Hastings Lake Bible Camp, Mulhurst Lutheran Camp and Camp Kuriakos. I continue to be amazed and thankful to God for the ministry of our Lutheran camps and appreciate the opportunity to rent their facilities for various Synod gatherings and meetings.

In September 2017, I invited the Camp Directors and Board Chairs to meet with me to review a Memorandum of Understanding which outlines the valuable partnership between the Camps and the Synod. Each camp: Hastings Lake Bible Camp, Mulhurst Lutheran Camp and Camp Kuriakos was invited to discuss at a Board level the Memorandum of Understanding and to consider signing the document. Thus far, one Camp has signed the Memorandum.

Monthly Synod Messages for Congregations and Lay and Rostered Leaders. Each month I seek to prepare a brief article distributed through the ABT Synod's weekly enewsletter, *Wednesday's Word* and available on the Synod's webpage. My intent is that these writings be shared through congregational newsletters and/or posted on a bulletin board or by other communication means within a congregation. Often, they may be appropriate for use as people gather for church council, adult study, youth group, coffee group, or choir rehearsal.

2016 Area Gatherings. In the fall of 2016 we gathered again in three area gatherings under the theme: One Bread, One Body (EvLW #496): There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:28. Thank you to the rostered and lay leaders of the following congregations for hosting us: Trinity Lutheran, Westlock; Messiah Lutheran, Camrose; and Nazareth Lutheran, Standard. In addition to the Bishop's time...a game of Synodical Jeopardy...we welcomed three guest presenters: Dr. Julien Hammond, Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Officer, Roman Catholic Diocese of Edmonton, sharing about Reformation 500: A Roman Catholic Perspective; Wayne Street, Synod Council Chair, member of Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Lethbridge, sharing about Area Leadership Teams;

(at two of the Area gatherings) The Rev. Dr. Marc Jerry, Chair of Faith, Order and Doctrine Committee of the National Church Council and Pastor of Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer, shared *To Love Our Neighbours as Ourselves; A Study of Orders of Ministry in the ELCIC.* Each presentation was informative and very well received.

2017 Area Gatherings. In the fall of 2017 we gathered in three area gatherings under the theme: *Celebrate the Promise, Celebrate the Hope* based on the text of a hymn introduced at the 12th Assembly of The Lutheran World Federation.

Thank you to the rostered and lay leaders of the following congregations for hosting us: Ascension, Edmonton; Peace, Innisfail and All Saints, Calgary. In addition to the Bishop's time a National Church Convention Delegates report was shared together with time for Q&A, information and conversation related to Areas and Area Leadership Teams, and a report from the 12th Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation.

2017 Congregational Life Workshop. The Leadership Development Ministry Team diligently prepared for the March 25, 2017 Congregational Life Workshop at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer: WORSHIP: WHEN RUINS REJOICE "Break forth together into singing, you ruins of Jerusalem." - Isaiah 52:9.

The keynote presenter was Paul Vasile, Executive Director of "Music That Makes Community". Workshops included:

- Proclamation with Power The Rev. Dr. Laura Holck,
- Words for Worship The Rev. Daranne Harris,
- This is the Night! Robyn Simpson-Mohr and The Rev. Kristian Wold,
- Letter of Call Documents Lisa Thiessen, Executive Director, ELCIC Group Services (for Treasurers and Congregational Chairpersons),
- plus, a worship resources display table.

2018 Congregational Life Workshop. The ABT Synod CARE (Congregational Action and Response for Mental Health) Ministry Team diligently prepared for the April 14, 2018 Congregational Life Worship at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer: "No One Is Immune: Taking Action for Mental Health in Congregations."

The keynote presenter was The Rev. John Dowds, Lead Chaplain/Senior Mental Health Consultant – City of Edmonton.

Workshops included:

- The Power of Hope to Deal with Mental Health Issues Dr. Cheryl Nekolaichuk and Dr. Bill Chimich,
- Handling Anxiety Across the Life Cycle Gail Mukaida,

- Ministering to the Needs of Youth at our Synod Camps Marg Daly,
- Preparing the Church Secretary/Administrator to Handle Mental Health Issues – Kathie Goetz Thompson,
- plus a resources display table.

3. Innovative Tradition:

Synod Communications. A weekly ABT Synod e-newsletter *Wednesday's Word*, began in January 2016, and continues to be refined. Currently there are over 350 subscribers. Each edition is archived on the Synod website. Please see the synod website to subscribe to *Wednesday's Word*.

All Ministry Team Gathering. An Annual All Ministry Team gathering took place May 6, 2017 at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer. Together, we shared in worship, reflected on Scripture, prayed, listened, dialogued, and collaborated with other ministry teams active in our Synod, as well as worked as individual ministry teams. A 2018 All Ministry Team gathering was cancelled due to illness and winter conditions in the southern parts of our Synod.

National Convention Delegates Pre-Convention Gathering. Synod Delegates to the ELCIC National Convention gathered June 10, 2017 at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer for a time of convention agenda review, orientation for first time delegates, and conversation. Twenty-three of the twenty-seven delegates were able to participate. Prior to the gathering Judy Wry and I prepared a survey which was distributed to each delegate. The results became the agenda items for the gathering. National Church Synod representatives: Judy Wry, Les Pearson, The Rev. Dr. Marc Jerry and I facilitated the gathering. Delegates expressed enthusiastic appreciation for this time together. Delegates also met twice during the National Convention with me. Three delegates: The Rev. Barbara Groote, Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken, and Wayne Street were tasked with preparing a report of the Convention with input from other delegates. This was shared at each of the fall 2017 area gatherings and then made available through the Synod office for use in congregations.

"Ponder Anew – Dinner with Bishop **Larry" –** Planned Giving Events. Five planned giving events, *Ponder Anew*, took place in the spring of 2017. PR materials were made available through *Wednesday's Word* and the Synod website. Partial funding for these events was provided through a grant from the Lutheran Triune Foundation and through the Synod's Reserve Fund. Synod staff worked with Joe Stolee and Pamela Giles (Faithful Servant Consulting) to prepare for the events. I was very pleased with each event. Costs were well within the proposed budget; offerings of \$7,021 were received. We had hoped for 300 participants and 390 people actually participated!

Joe and Pamela included the following in their lengthy report to me: *Brooks, May 28 – 65 participants; Red Deer, June 9 – 35 participants; Edmonton, June 10 – 110 participants; Calgary, June 24 – 70 participants; and, Camrose, June 25 – 110*

participants. The mood at all the events was very upbeat, and we received much positive feedback during the events and after. Many people marvelled that they had been unaware of aspects of the Synod work, of the number of candidates registered with the CTEL, and of the work that had been made possible as a result of generous gifts that had been made in the past ten years through donor bequests and through the closure of the Augustana and St. John congregations. Many others commented that they had not really thought about making a gift to the church in their will or even made a will, and now they were thinking about it.

Work is being done to create a Planned Giving/Endowment Ministry Team within our Synod. Terms of Reference are being developed as well as consideration as to who might serve on the Ministry Team.

4. Collaborative Partnerships:

40th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women. As a result of initial conversation between Bishop Sauer and myself, a gathering was planned, May 29-31, 2017 in Calgary for women in rostered leadership to commemorate the 40th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women. Forty-four participated in the event representing every Synod of the ELCIC as well as ecumenical representation. The Rev. Dr. Karoline Lewis, Marbury E. Anderson Chair in Biblical Preaching, Luther Seminary shared "SHE: Five Keys to Unlock the Power of Women in Ministry." Much thanks to the Synod staff: The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, Darla Wildfang and Sheryl Burry for their incredible work of planning and providing support during the event.

Trinity Lutheran, Whitehorse. In conversation with the church council arrangements were made for four rostered leaders to fly to Whitehorse (one rostered leader for several days each month) beginning September 2016 providing worship and Eucharistic ministry, visitation, Bible Study, confirmation class, youth ministry, and so on. Thank you to the following Pastors and Congregations for their partnership in this ministry experiment: The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow (Synod Staff), The Rev. Ingrid Doerschel (Trinity, Edmonton), The Rev. Barbara Groote (Ascension, Edmonton) and The Rev. Phil Holck (Lutheran Church of the Cross, Calgary). In the spring of 2017 this shared ministry model was reviewed by the church council and rostered leaders and a second year began using the same model with The Rev. Les Skonnard (Lethbridge and serving with the Good Samaritan Society) replacing The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow. This experiment has been a wonderful experience for Trinity Lutheran and for the rostered leaders involved. While in Whitehorse in 2017 I had several congregants says to me, "we are so excited! We now have four pastors and most congregations only have one."

Reformation 500. Synod Commemorations of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation included a gathering together with Roman Catholics on October 31, 2016 to view together (via livestream) in at least Edmonton and Calgary, the "Common Prayer" worship from Lund, Sweden led by Lutheran World Federation leadership and Pope Francis.

Our Synod hosted two Hymnfests (prepared for the 2016 Synod Convention) in 2017: March 17 at Hope Lutheran, Calgary and March 17 at Hosanna Lutheran, Edmonton. Lutherans, Roman Catholics and Anglicans participated in all these events.

"Common Prayer" worship was led by Roman Catholic Bishop William McGratton and me in Calgary, October 29, 2017 at Hope Lutheran; Roman Catholic Archbishop Richard Smith and me in Edmonton, October 30, 2017 at All Saints Anglican Cathedral: and Roman Catholic Bishop Hector Vila and me in Whitehorse, Yukon, November 16, 2017 at Sacred Heart Cathedral. In each "Common Prayer" service the Anglican Bishop also participated: Archbishop Greg Kerr-Wilson, Bishop Jane Alexander and Bishop Larry Robertson. A tri-lateral covenant was signed at the Edmonton "Common Prayer" service committing to on-going dialogue and learning. This LARC (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic) group met for the first time in January 2018 and I anticipate further opportunities for shared learning, service and worship. I am thankful for our Synod's Ecumenical Officers, Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken and The Rev. Daranne Harris, who have been working with their Roman Catholic counterparts to organize, plan and facilitate. Significant support and planning for the event in Whitehorse was provided by The Rev. Barbara Groote.

Several academic institutions in Calgary jointly focused on a series of presentations and conversation in the fall of 2017 reflecting Reformation 500. Together, Roman Catholic Bishop William McGratton, Archbishop Greg Kerr-Wilson and I, participated in a presentation at St. Mary's University, Calgary. It was a fascinating evening as we each presented on the theme from our denominational perspective, commented on each other's presentation and responded to questions.

Together with Dr. Julien Hammond, Ecumenical and Interfaith Officer of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Edmonton, and Diaconal Minister Dr. Faith Nostbakken, I shared in presenting around the theme of *Reformation* at the Ronning Centre: UofA – Augustana Campus fall 2016. I was also pleased to share, November 18, 2017 at Our Saviours, Hay Lakes, in "Lift It Up: A Reformation Celebration Through Music."

Many congregations and Roman Catholic parishes gathered together during the season of Lent 2017 to study the joint resource, *Together in Christ – Lutheran and Catholics*

Commemorating the Reformation, and many other congregational and ecumenical events were held across our Synod.

En Missión Con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador. Thank you for your on-going prayerful support and directed gifts, as congregations and individuals, for our Synod's mission, En Missión con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador, with The Rev. Dr. Brian Rude serving as program staff. Directed gifts may be sent to the Synod, clearly marked for "In Mission with El Salvador." In March 2017 and 2018 letters of thanks, a report from Pastor Brian and a financial update were prepared and distributed. These materials were also made available through the Synod's weekly enewsletter, Wednesday's Word, and the Synod website.

Companion Synod – The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia (IELCO). Conversation continues with the two ELCA Synods, national ELCA staff, and our Synod regarding updates from IELCO. In consultation with our Synod's Global Missions Ministry Team chair, The Rev. Scott Brown, I invited The Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen (Hosanna, Edmonton), the ABT Synod representative on the National Church Council's Global Mission Task Force, to represent me at the International Consultation for Companion Synods and Companion Churches in Latin America and the Caribbean on November 9- 13, 2016 in Lima, Peru. In addition to ELCA Global Mission staff and companion church leaders, participants at this consultation were representatives of those ELCA and ELCIC synods that are in a relationship with a church or synod in Latin America and the Caribbean.

IELCO Delegation to our Synod. I am looking forward to welcoming our Colombian guests and ELCA staff to our Synod Convention. Our Synod is working in partnership with Bethel, Camrose to bring our guests to the Synod. Thank you to the Lutheran Triune Foundation for partial financial support and to the planning team for coordinating this visit with me: Mark Rintoul, Donna Heine, The Rev. Barbara Groote, and Alan and Val Fielding.

Our guests will be: Bishop Atahualpa Hernández Miranda and his wife, Rev. Angélica Bernate Rojas; along with Rev. Diana Carolina Londoño Espinosa and her husband, Óscar Ricardo Niño Durán; and ELCA Global Mission Staff, Manager for Relationships, Latin America and the Caribbean, Paulina Dasse, who will be present with us for the Synod Convention.

Their journey, June 12-25, 2018, will include participation at the Synod Convention and then they will be touring and sharing throughout our Synod. Watch for an opportunity to welcome and to hear our guests!

IELCO and Companion Synod Consultation. Our Synod will host an IELCO and Companion Synod Consultation, June 18-19, 2018 in Edmonton. Participants will include members of IELCO, two ELCA Synods, ELCA staff and our Synod. I look forward to this time of shared consultation and planning together. I have asked The Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen, chair of our Synod's Global Missions Ministry Team to join me for the consultation.

Synod Delegation to Colombia. Tricia Hoeppner (Ascension, Edmonton) and I will be facilitating our Synod's Delegation to Colombia July 26-August 6, 2018, a partnership between our Synod and Ascension Lutheran. The 12 participants (including one from the SASK Synod) have already met for the first of two pre-orientation sessions which include pre-journey learning, sharing, group-building, worship, and so on. Your prayers as we prepare for our journey are appreciated.

Camp Effectiveness Survey. The Executive Officers, in the fall of 2017, approved funds from the Synod Reserve Fund to assist with a Camp Effectiveness Survey. I look forward to receiving and reviewing the data gathered. My correspondence to congregational leaders: rostered, council chairs, youth leaders said in part:

Across our Synod there are many opportunities to be in collaborative partnerships. One of these is with the outdoor ministries which relate to our Synod: Hastings Lake Lutheran Bible Camp, Mulhurst Lutheran Church Camp, Peace Lutheran Bible Camp, and Sylvan Lake Lutheran Bible Camp (Kuriakos).

These outdoor ministries, in cooperation with our Synod, are participating in an Effective Camp Research Project, examining the impact of the Christian summer camp experience on campers, families, and church communities. This summer, youth participating in camp programs will complete surveys concerning the long-term impact of camps, beyond the so called "camp high".

The information gathered will assist our outdoor ministries in providing strong programs for Christian faith development, growth and leadership.

As outdoor ministries are strong partners with our Synod, I encourage you to participate in the initiative and complete the survey by clicking on the link, below. The information gathered will help shape the future of our camp and retreat centers, and their partnership with the Synod, its congregations and ministries.

Full Communion Partners. I continue to appreciate the shared ministry partnerships and conversations with the Anglican Dioceses and their Bishops on the same

geographical area of our Synod. This is a collaborative partnership of growing possibility and opportunity.

Abiding in Right Relations Ministry Team (AIRR). With the co-chairs of AIRR, The Rev. Dr. Ann Salmon and Carl Rausch, having recently moved to Saskatoon, the AIRR Ministry Team is in a time of re-organizing. We now have a four-member team in place, representing different geographical areas of the Synod. I was honored to participate in a time of listening and learning together with AIRR Ministry Team members and Anglican leadership at Siksika First Nations October 21, 2016. Bishop Jessica Crist (ELCA Montana Synod) and I worked toward a second crossborder, cross-denomination AIRR event in Montana — October 16-17, 2018, at Wolf Point, Montana. However, due to a low number of registrations the event was cancelled. Thank you to The Rev. Faith Brace who represented me and AIRR on the planning team.

I have appointed Dr. Andrea Wilhelm to represent me on the Edmonton-based "Our Common Ground" committee, which consists of Anglicans, Lutherans, United Church, and Roman Catholic participants. The two staffers are Rick Chapman, chaplain from Inter-City Pastoral Ministry (ICPM), and Michelle Nieviadomy, who is with the Native Healing Centre (Reformed Church) as well as ICPM. The committee began its work in 2017, and with grant funding from the Anglican Foundation, held 4 "Our Common Ground" events which explored the common ground we have as people of faith, e.g.: common ground around prayer from the different Christian and Indigenous traditions. April 2018 - February 2019, the committee's main project is a 9-week small group discussion-based curriculum for up to 20 people, which will deepen and expand the learning from the previous year.

CARE (Congregational Action and Response for Mental Health) Ministry Team. CARE is a Synod-wide initiative focusing on the following priorities: raising awareness of the reality of mental health issues in congregations; educating and training lay people and rostered leaders about mental illness, and helpful responses; identifying resources available for congregations; and encouraging the development of local resource for congregations. Funding per congregation / ministry in our Synod is available to train with Mental Health First Aid Canada. Additionally, the Southwestern Area and the Synod's CARE Ministry Team jointly sponsored a Mental Health First Aid Canada at Lutheran Church of the Cross, November 2017 with the costs of the event covered by the Synod's CARE Ministry Team. To date, approximately 80 individuals from across our Synod have participated in this training.

In collaboration with the Synod's Worship and the Arts Ministry Team a worship service was prepared for congregational use February 2017 with a theme of mental health. This material is available on the Synod's website and is easily adaptable.

Refugee Sponsorships. A number of ABT Synod congregations and ministries have become refugee sponsors or have explored becoming one. Some congregations have committed to sponsoring one or more families; some are still deciding. Many congregations are working collaboratively with other Lutheran congregations or church denominations. It is wonderful to hear so many stories of interest and commitment.

Compassionate Justice Initiative – Synod Antipoverty Grants. Reports have been received at the Synod office for applications approved for each of the past two years and a year-end report was sent to our National Office.

Healthy Boundaries. A first 'Healthy Boundaries' workshop took place March 7, 2018 at Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, Red Deer facilitated by National Bishop Susan Johnson. All rostered leaders were invited, and I am currently in the process of identifying three individuals to be trained to continue to offer this learning event once each year.

Ft. McMurray Fire. Response to the fire in Ft. McMurray in May 2016 was generous and overwhelming by our Synod, across Canada, and indeed, around the world. Rostered Leaders in or near Edmonton provided chaplaincy support, Lutheran Campus Ministry provided care and ministry on the UofA campus, donations to CLWR were incredible, congregations in or near Ft. McMurray provided accommodations, meals, personal items, and so on. Conversation via teleconference continued following the devastation for nearly two years on a regular basis with CLWR representatives, the LC-C and myself, with updates provided, planning, and fund distribution being much of our conversation. An application for funds was mutually created and made available through the LC-C and our Synod offices.

The week following the devastation our Synod hosted an evening service of Prayer and Lament at Trinity, Edmonton. Several from the Christ the King, Ft. McMurray congregation attended as well as many from Lutheran congregations in and around Edmonton.

On May 28, 2016 Cathy and I gathered with The Rev. Susan and Cliff Horton and current and former Christ the King, Ft. McMurray congregants for worship on an acreage south of Athabasca, which included a baptism and Eucharist. Some months previously, Pastor Susan had announced her retirement, so all were experiencing several layers of grief as we gathered together. Susan and Cliff have now settled in Stony Plain.

Conversation via teleconference also regularly took place between denominational judicatory leadership including the Anglican Church of Canada, United Church of Canada, Presbyterian, LC-C and myself. We shared updated information, planning and how we might work together to provide support and care now and, in the months, to come.

Together with representatives of CLWR and LC-C, The Rev. Susan Horton and I visited Ft. McMurray to view for ourselves the devastation and to meet with members of the Lutheran community. A second journey to Ft. McMurray with representatives of CLWF and LC-C and myself took place August 2017 for the purpose of learning how the funds received through CLWR were being used, to meet with various representatives and to explore further support. The various ministries provided were very meaningful and deeply appreciated.

Foodgrains – CLWR, LC-C and ABT Synod. In the summer of 2017 Foodgrains, CLWR, LC-C, myself and congregational representation from Mt. Olivet, Sherwood Park and St. Johns, Ardrossan met to learn more about the work of the Foodgrains bank. A harvest gathering took place August 27, 2017 hosted by Glory Lutheran, Sherwood Park which I also attended.

OTHER MINISTRY

Joint Anglican Lutheran Commission. I welcome the opportunity to continue serving as an ELCIC appointed member of the Joint Anglican Lutheran Commission (JALC). The work of this commission is energizing, informative and reflects well our own mission priority of Collaborative Partnerships.

House of Bishops and Conference of Bishops. Yearly the Anglican and Lutheran Bishops gather for learning, encouragement, relationship building and worship. Together with Bishop Greg Mohr I am part of a small group of Bishops planning for our gatherings.

Faith, Order and Doctrine. I continue to serve as National Church Council appointment on the Faith, Order and Doctrine (FOD) committee. Recent work has been focused on the Orders of Ministry study and paper. A very interesting, informative and meaningful part of the process of developing the study was a meeting of FOD together with the Diaconal Ministers and candidates providing opportunity for members of FOD to hear from and to learn from these rostered leaders and candidates.

Advisory group – Authorized Lay Ministries. Fall 2016 I was appointed by National Church Council to a four-member advisory group to develop guidelines for Authorized Lay

Ministries. Appointments included National Staff, one member each from the Program Committee for Leadership Ministry and the Program Committee for Worship, and myself. The guidelines were reviewed and approved by National Church Council in September 2017.

Delegate to LWF Assembly. I was honored (and excited!) to be one of the delegates journeying with National Bishop Susan Johnson, Rev. Katherine Altenburg (Eastern Synod), and Dan LeBlanc (SASK Synod) to the Lutheran World Federation's 12th Assembly which took place May 2017 in Namibia, with a preassembly gathering in Suriname, South America, in August 2016.

During the elections at the 12th Assembly I was elected to serve on The LWF Council as one of six members from the North American Region. I am aware of the richness, and the fullness, of my role as Synod Bishop, including the many time commitments and responsibilities. As a member of The LWF Council I will be participating in meetings of the Council once per year, serving as a member of the Mission and Development Committee, usually in May or June for one week, and alternating between Geneva and a member Church somewhere in the world. Though this responsibility certainly adds to my workload I do not anticipate it requiring significant time and I look forward to sharing the richness of this global experience and opportunity with our Synod, Church and Region.

I was asked to be the North American Region representative on a small committee tasked with reviewing the 12th Assembly and presenting **a report to the Council's meeting in July 2018**.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Dissolutions of Incorporated Congregations and Church Property. We continue to work with our Synod lawyer toward the dissolution of incorporated congregations which have closed or are defunct. This work is necessary, and a cost to the Synod. We have also been working with our Synod lawyer to work toward the proper ownership of the land upon which one of the congregations of our Synod sits. This is work that is also necessary, and should have been done decades ago, prior to several mergers.

An **Officer's Consultation** (national and synodical) was held December 2017 in Winnipeg, MB. Present from the ABT Synod were Chair Wayne Street, Secretary Marilyn Murray and myself. In a conference call of ABT Synod Officers following the Consultation, appreciation was expressed for the opportunity to gather in this way and to meet leadership from the other synods and our national church. One outcome from the meeting was that Synod Council meeting minutes will be distributed to the national and synodical secretaries for

distribution to council members and that synod council meetings will include on their agenda a time for "what are we learning from other synods and the national". Following learning and conversation, it was agreed to focus on three areas: financial, motion 95-11 and the role of national and synod, and communications. These three working groups are continuing to meet and to work.

ELCIC National Convention. The 2019 National Convention will take place at the University of Regina, Regina, July 11-13, 2019. The ABT Synod will have an additional rostered delegate with apportionment based on the December 31, 2016 parochial reports: 15 Lay, 2 Youth and 11 Rostered for a total of 28 delegates.

PERSONAL MINISTRY

Sabbatical – November 2016-January 2017. *Reflections on the Sabbatical Leave* – Reflections about Larry.

Walter Brueggemann makes the wonderful statement that, "Sabbath is an invitation to image our life differently" (Finally Comes the Poet: Daring Speech for Imagination). Much of my time in journal writing, reflecting and praying centered around this imaging.

As I began the Sabbatical I realized immediately just how tired I really was. While re-reading Brueggemann's book I came across the following words which affirmed not only my exhaustion but the life-giving gift that the Sabbatical was for me. "A startling theological claim is made for the Sabbath as God's day of rest in Exodus 31:17: '...The Lord made heaven and earth, and on the seventh day he rested and was refreshed.' The text uses the verb *nap hash* in the reflexive, suggesting that Yahweh was exhausted, diminished, and the Sabbath made it possible for God to receive life back."

Henri Nouwen's words spoke into this weariness and this gift of Sabbatical too: "While realizing that ten years ago I didn't have the faintest idea that I would end up where I now am, I still like to keep up the illusion that I am in control of my own life. I like to decide what I most need, what I will do next, what I want to accomplish, and how others will think of me. While being so busy running my own life, I become oblivious to the gentle movements of the Spirit of God within me, pointing me in directions guite different from my own.

It requires a lot of inner solitude and silence to become aware of these divine movements. God does not shout, scream, or push. The Spirit of God is soft and gentle like a small voice or light breeze. It is the spirit of love." (Here and Now: Living in the Spirit)

Imagine. The Spirit of God pointing. Growing awareness of these divine movements.

Imagining my life differently means in part that I have reconnected with my most deep friendships, I have re-engaged in exploring the gift of music, and I have intentionally carved out time for days off and holiday.

Reflections on the Sabbatical Leave – Reflections about Family.

One of the greatest joys in the Sabbatical gift has been quantity and quality time with my family. Cathy and I spent much time together...talking, walking, laughing, remembering...simply being. Time with our children, too, was a gift. They are caring, inquisitive, loving, supporting, encouraging, teasing, gifted young adults. And I am so proud of each of them! On behalf of Cathy, Paul and Kim, Matthew, Anna, and Jordan, I thank you for this Sabbatical gift.

The Sabbatical also gifted me with quantity time with my extended family: parents, twin, and two sisters. All offered me, without reservation, the gift of presence, silence, tears and laughter. And I am so thankful.

Reflections on the Sabbatical Leave – Reflections about Our Synod.

Thank-you to each of you who shared your God given gifts with us all during these past three months! I express particular thanks to The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, who served capably as Commissary; Darla Wildfang, Executive Assistant; Synod Executive – Wayne Street, Marilyn Murray and Stephen Wildfang; and the Deans: The Revs. Trish Schmermund, Eleanor Ness, Kathy Calkins, Kristian Wold and Reg Berg. Thank-you. *Conclusion.*

Celebrating the gift of a Sabbatical leave means a deep, deep sense of gratitude and thanksgiving for me: to God for sustaining and upholding me during this time, for insights gained, imagination rekindled. Sabbatical time in order to receive life back. For deeper listening and deeper discerning of my calling as your Bishop.

Bishop Self-Care and Spiritual Renewal. As per Synod Council policy, Bishop Self-Care and Spiritual Renewal, I strive to take a one-day personal retreat each month and twice a year take a two-day personal retreat. In 2017 I did not follow this pattern; however, I have resumed this pattern in 2018. I have continued to see a Spiritual Director, meeting almost every month. I am thankful for this care and support from the Synod. I continue to meet on a regular basis with a committee of, currently, three retired rostered and one lay leaders.

Continuing Education. In 2016 I attended the National Worship Conference at Wilfred Laurier University, Kitchener-Waterloo: Formation & Reformation: Worship, Justice and God's Mission. I also participated in the Music That Makes Community three-day learning event in Calgary 2017.

I continue to seek to minister with the Core Values of affirmation, involvement and servant-leadership. My personal mission is to engage, empower and equip for ministry.

Abiding in Right Relations (AiRR) Ministry Team

As a result of Co-chairs Rev. Ann Salmon and Carl Rausch moving to take a call in another province, this ministry team has been mainly inactive in the past six months, since the summer of 2017. New members have been appointed to the committee: Harold (Buzz) Robinson, Edmonton; and Dale Woitt, Wetaskiwin. The committee now consists of Rev. Faith Brace, Cochrane; Rev. Ron Flamand, Rolly View; and the two new members.

The Cross-Border Event with the ELCA Montana Synod, to be held at Wolf Point, Fort Peck Reservation in eastern Montana in October 2017, was cancelled because of insufficient registration, a great disappointment to the four people from Alberta who planned to attend. There is no information at present as to whether the event will be planned for another time.

Meanwhile, many cultural and educational and spiritual events related to the 94 Calls to Action take place among Alberta churches and community organizations, giving opportunity to Lutherans throughout the Synod to experience the surge of interest in reconciliation between Indigenous people and other Canadians. I have personally been part of a group from All Saints Anglican Parish in Cochrane who conduct a grief and loss circle among young adults at Stoney Nakoda First Nation in Morley, AB. It is led by an Anglican deacon who is qualified in transition ministry, and it includes a hot lunch prepared by members of the parish. Every week there is opportunity to serve the people who come, to listen to them, hear of their individual experiences and begin to understand their struggle with community breakdown, personal loss and pain. I hope that many Lutherans across the Synod will find such opportunities in their local areas.

Congregational Action and Response for Mental Health (CARE) Ministry Team

CARe is a Synod initiative to promote mental wellness and health in our congregations and in our communities. Mental wellness and health issues are a serious concern in our society and our congregations. The people of the Church and in our congregations have a unique role to play in supporting all persons to achieve mental health. In addition, our Lutheran theology speaks to mental well-being.

There are two fundamental goals of this ministry team:

- to assist congregations to become more informed of mental health issues in society and the church; and
- to share resources and ideas within the Synod.

Work to Date:

- Created a page on the ABT Synod website which focuses on CARe information and provides resources which congregations are encouraged to be aware of and use
- Researched the most supportive and effective ways to make use of existing mental health resources. The Team especially found that the Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) program of the Mental Health Commission of Canada is a very useful, straightforward and easily accessible resource for congregations and people wanting to take part in the priorities of the ministry. MHFA is easily accessed through the internet.
- Workshops and presentations since the last Synod convention:
 - Grace Lutheran Church, Hinton, organized and held a series of workshops with presenter resources from within the Synod.
 - CARe encouraged and promoted local groupings of congregations and church leaders in their own organizing of Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) workshops; it provided the financial resources and assistance in organizing these.
 - The Ministry Team and Synod leaders, and members of congregations, have participated in two separate, two-day MHFA workshops organized by CARe.
 - A MHFA workshop was held in Calgary in November 2017. It was fully subscribed, with the possibility of further workshop opportunities.
 - The Synod's 2018 Congregational Life Event was titled 'No One is Immune: Taking Action for Mental Health in Congregations, which included workshops on mental health and wellness, with a MHFA keynote presenter.
- CARe continues to provide financial support to congregations through \$100.00 "scholarships" in support of members enrolling in MHFA workshops – up to three per congregation. MHFA's own workshops are provided by trained facilitators in many places across the Synod and have varying focuses.
- A congregational worship resource was developed in partnership with the Synod's Worship Ministry Team.
- CARe allocated funds to the Bishop in support of the **Synod's clergy**-assistance and support program.

Going Forward:

- Team members continue to be available to meet with local groups to provide information, encouragement and support for workshops and scholarships. Contact the Synod office for more information.
- Financial support for locally-organized MHFA workshops continues.
- CARe has agreed to support one workshop a year for each of the next two years, with the 2018 Congregational Life Event being the first of these.
- CARe is endeavoring to set up and fund a MHFA workshop in the Red Deer area.
- The individual MHFA-related "scholarship" program continues, and congregations and individuals are encouraged to take advantage of this.
- The Team is coming to realize that a mental health ministry intersects with the Synod's other ministries addressing many other issues for people and congregations – and that there are opportunities for intersectional ministry.

Global Mission Ministry Team

"Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." 1 Corinthians 1:3

You will notice several changes that have happened in the past two years with the ministry and our report. First, we have changed our name. This brings us into an easier understanding for our colleagues in this work as many use the title, "Global Mission". Recently, the Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen was appointed to the Global Mission Ministry Team.

Some ministry areas that we are working on at present are the following:

Colombia. We welcome Bishop Atahualpa
 Hernandez as the new Bishop of IELCO. Plans
 have been underway since January, for him and a
 group from Colombia to visit us at the Synod

- convention in 2018. A working group has been established to prepare for the visit of our Colombian guests. As well, a new covenant between IELCO and our Synod will be signed during the Synod Convention.
- 2. Synod Delegation to Colombia. The next journey to Colombia is set for July 26-August 6, 2018. Bishop Larry will be facilitating this trip along with Tricia Hoeppner (Ascension Lutheran, Edmonton). The twelve participants will be meeting twice for preeducation prior to the journey. Pictures and a report of the trip will be shared with the Synod via Wednesday's Word after their return.
- En Missión Con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador. Pr. Brian Rude continues his work and presence in El Salvador. We are pleased that he will be joining us for Synod Convention and sharing of this ministry throughout the Synod following the Convention.

Some other matters that I would bring to your attention as well:

- A. National Church Global Missions. You will all have received a brochure in your congregational mailings about the on-going nature of global missions. I commend it to you.
- B. Consultation. We continue to work to build relationships with our sister synods in the ELCA that are partnered with us in Colombia. Immediately after the Synod Convention representatives from our synod, the two synods in the ELCA, ELCA staff and the members from Colombia will meet in Edmonton to review our mission work.

I would ask the delegates to continue to pray for all refugees around the world, and especially those in two different situations. The Middle Eastern situation continues to be quite fluid at the moment. Syrian refugees are struggling to survive, adapt to new countries and find the necessities of life in refugee camps. Further, the situation with the Rohingya refugees is still not resolved.

I have now served some eight years on this committee/ministry. Since God is leading me into new areas and adventures in ministry, I have submitted my resignation from the Global Missions Ministry Team to the Bishop. It has been a pleasure to serve this dynamic and on-going ministry.

Leadership Development Ministry Team

The Leadership Development Ministry Team is responsible to plan and provide opportunities to enhance skills in leadership for laypeople and rostered personnel in the Synod of Alberta and the Territories. Accountable to the **Bishop's** Office, it helps to fulfill the Synod Mission Priorities of *Spiritled Leadership*, (equipping and empowering to practice the disciplines of

Biblical engagement, prayer and spiritual direction), and *Hope-filled Discipleship* (encouraging, equipping, supporting, and inspiring ministries within the Synod).

The focus of the Leadership Development Committee's work in the past two years has been on organizing the annual Congregational Life Event, a one-day workshop—usually held in March or April—on a theme of contemporary relevance in the church. These events offer the opportunity for ABT Synod members to explore issues of interest in their church and spiritual lives, and a chance to showcase the incredible work that is being done in many fields by pastors and laypeople around the synod.

The theme of the 2017 Congregational Life Event was "Worship: When Ruins Rejoice." Paul Vasile, executive director of Music that Makes Community— "a non-profit organization working with ecumenical communities and leaders to empower and liberate communities' spiritual life through singing"—was the keynote speaker who offered reflections on what it means to gather for worship in the 21st century, and led the assembly in song. ABT Synod members Rev. Dr. Laura Holck, Rev. Daranne Harris, Robyn Simpson-Mohr, and Rev. Kristian Wold offered breakout sessions that built on the workshop theme. This event was generously supported financially by the SW Area Group. Members of the Synod Worship and the Arts Committee collaborated as organizers.

In 2018 responsibility for the organization of the Congregational Life Event moved to the Synod's CARE Committee, in followup to the very successful and important 2016 Event on mental health issues and the church.

Since the Leadership Development Committee was formed the landscape for continuing education has changed, and opportunities for Christian growth have proliferated. Within the Synod groups like the Retreat of Our Own, Synod Study Conference, and CARE are active in providing education and training; and at the seminary in Saskatoon the Lay

Leadership Academy is equipping church members for leadership. In light of the current context the Leadership Development Committee is currently taking a hiatus from its activities and spending some time reassessing its future role in the church.

Missional Formation Ministry Team

The Canadian Missions committee transitioned into the Missional Formation team and is responsible for CECF Church Extension Capital Fund (CECF) interest distribution recommendations and Creative Initiative grants. Sincere thanks to all who served through this time of change.

Canadian Missions CECF interest distribution: The amount available is based on the interest earned in the CECF which has historically been used to buy land and assist congregations with building mortgages. Funding criteria for *CECF interest distribution* includes congregational redevelopment, ethnic specific ministries, supporting pastors in mission congregations and providing funds for the training and equipping rostered ministers and laity for mission. Since the 2016 Synod convention \$ 91,130 of the CECF interest distribution has been granted to congregations and ministries.

Creative Initiatives: The CECF Committee began wondering how they could best steward the fund since it is generally no longer feasible to buy land and build new buildings. Creative Initiatives Synodical monies from amounts over the CECF cap, began in June 2015. Congregations and ministries continue to be invited to apply for Creative Initiatives grants which must be used before June 2020.

Since the 2016 Synod convention \$106,200 has been granted to congregations and ministries.

Learnings from Creative Initiatives experiments include the following:

Across the Synod (2016-2018):

- We are eager to find new ways of "being church," and new ways of joining God in our community.
- The pace of change in attitudes, imagination, perspectives and practices is slow and requires patience.
- Modelling spiritual practices and experiential learning is important. In this approach, as we risk, there are no failures, only opportunities to learn. Developing

- learning communities requires an adaptive leadership approach and skills.
- There are many benefits from gathering in a place to collaborate and discern with others. Cohorts became safe spaces for leaders who voiced hopes and anxieties.
- It is important to explore the impact of policies, organizational structures and expectations.

Across the ELCIC: (Jan 31, 2018)

- There has been an "awakening" a shift in awareness that things have changed, and we want to participate in God's mission.
- It is important to pay attention to the movement of the Holy Spirit, and our movement in joining the Spirit. We need engage in practices to listen to what the Spirit of God is saying.
- Encounter those in the community, especially those not like us, for the sake of reciprocal relationships (meeting neighbours, not just meeting needs).
- Stories expand the capacity for imagination.
- Tensions exist between the movement and institution, building new and upholding the existing and we need to embrace the disruption and conflict.
- We have theological riches in our Lutheran tradition that can move us from fear to freedom.

Synod Campus Ministry Team

The Synod Campus Ministry Team (SCMT) provides assistance to chaplains and local campus ministry councils to provide a Lutheran and Christian witness at post-secondary institutions in five communities across Alberta and is partially funded from Synod benevolence.

The Synod Campus Ministry Team continues to provide resources via Canada Post and the Synod's website for the Drive for Five fundraising event. The event has been renamed (since we are now on more than five campuses in Alberta) the SMART (Synod Missional Academic Response Team) Sunday. Thank you for your support for Campus Ministry through this annual initiative.

After several years of review and consideration the Synod Campus Ministry Team Manual was presented to and approved by Synod Council in September 2016. One of the significant changes was the desire for participation by those most closely connected to the ministry: chaplains and local councils. Meetings now include the chaplains, a representative (usually the chair) of each local campus council, and the Bishop.

A retreat for young adults continues at Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake each January with chaplains and students participating from several campuses, including Regina and Saskatoon. January 2017 the speaker was Laureen Wray and the theme, "Calling," with her presentation entitled, "please wait while your call is being connected," and in January 2018 the speakers were The Right Rev. Sidney Black, Suffragan Bishop of Treaty 7 Territory and his granddaughter, Danielle, and the theme, "Abiding in Right Relations."

Ecumenical Campus Ministry, Lethbridge – The Rev. Canon Erin Phillips

ECM Lethbridge rejoices in another year of campus ministry. Our chaplain, Erin Phillips, continues to forge connections and strengthen networks at Lethbridge's two post-secondary institutions, the Lethbridge College and the University of Lethbridge. This year we have connected students and faculty to new ideas through the Theology Reading Group; brought established congregations, willing volunteers and students in need together through end of term suppers and Campus Care Parcel projects; provided new knowledge to all through the annual Cade lecture series; experienced new relationships and watched many "Canadian firsts" with our fourth jointly sponsored refugee family from Syria; and identified the extent of student need on the University campus through a poverty study. The purposeful work continues!

Lutheran Campus Ministry - UofC, Mount Royal University, Calgary - The Rev. Margaret Propp With the generous gift of the Triune Foundation, LCM-Calgary expanded their 40%-time ministry to 60% by including Mount Royal University. The current model of running the Drum/Dine/Discuss outreach once a week at the UofC now operates at MRU. Currently we have anywhere from 30-50 students taking part in the Drum/Dine/Discuss every week between the two institutions. The leadership training program called the Peer Partnership Programme also had 12 students from several institutions throughout Calgary (U of C, MRU, Ambrose, SAIT, and MaKami Collage). LCM-Calgary serves a very diverse demographic. The magnitude of outreach has only been possible through a collegial collaboration with the United/Presbyterian campus ministry. We are currently looking into research and models of Campus Ministry to be more financially self-sustaining. We see the vital and life-giving work of Campus Ministry as essential to the formation of young people in their education.

As numerous students have expressed "What you do here...... this has been the most significant and life-giving part of my week and time at University!" (former MRU Students Union Rep)

Medicine Hat Ecumenical Campus Ministry – The Rev. Kristy Reimers-Loader

The work of raising awareness of the chaplaincy over the past year has proven very fruitful. As I move around the College from day to day, I experience a growing recognition amongst the people I meet; more and more people are aware of who their Chaplain is, what she's doing, and how she might be helpful for situations which may arise. Hence, I've experienced an increase in the number of people requesting appointments as well as those who will stop me in the hallways and talk. This is extremely gratifying, to say the least. The work of pastoral care remains the most meaningful form of ministry I practice at the College. Without breaching the confidence of any of the people with whom I have spoken, I have dealt with a number of students, staff, and faculty in varying states of distress, grief, confusion, stress, and sadness. In all cases, I have endeavored to be fully present in the encounter, and to meet the people where they were, emotionally and spiritually. I have prayed with, and for these people, and I have prayed for many others by explicit request. Programming has included: soup lunches, daily silent meditation, Wednesday coffee hour, and weekly prayer for the community within and around the College, and for the world. The Board engaged the services of a local videographer, with a view to producing a short promotional film that would detail the work of the chaplaincy at the College. This has been completed and has been hailed as a successful project.

This ministry represents the spirit of Christ working in the world; that through a principally Christian-funded and sustained ministry, people of all faith traditions—and those holding no particular faith—may enjoy the benefit of our Creator's love expressed through the provision of a safe, inclusive space and where, prior to any other consideration, each individual's humanity is honoured, and they are granted the dignity and respect owed to all Creation.

Augustana Chaplaincy, Camrose – Sara Smith (Assistant for Chaplaincy)

This year's theme has been Feast, Pray, Serve. We adopted this theme in order to intentionally transform our activities towards the model given for the early church in the Book of Acts. A new academic calendar challenged us to change our set worship times from Monday, Wednesday, and Fridays to Tuesday and Thursdays. We took this opportunity to create a new form of worship on Wednesday nights where we join together in Holy Communion, a chili supper, and an activity

that varies from week to week. This could be in the form of a guest speaker, a demonstration of a different worship practice such as centering prayer or a fun community building time. This is often an intimate meal with 12-15 students that allows us to get to know one another on a different level compared to the dinners we continue to host on Tuesday nights that feed 90-120 people.

Recently, we supported six student chaplains who engage in peer ministry and small group activities through the campus. They regularly host knitting nights with a group of community ladies and students, worship nights on Sunday evenings as well as the larger events such as SCORE! that continue to be a staple within the campus. They provide a face to chaplaincy that extends beyond worship to activities such as compliments and encouragements posted to every door in residence just before exams and bring a personal touch of joy and compassion to campus during some of the most stressful times.

This current winter semester has provided Pastor Craig Wentland, Campus Chaplain, with an opportunity to take a short sabbatical after his 12 years of service. We have been privileged to have Rev. Ron Flamand (retired) join us as a part-time interim chaplain in Craig's absence. We recently hosted a fundraising event entitled Feast, Pray, Serve: Chaplaincy and All That Jazz. The evening was arranged similar to a jazz vespers service and Interim Chaplain Ron Flamand was the guest speaker. This was a very successful event and is on-par with previous year's fundraising dinners. As many people are aware, the University of Alberta as a whole is experiencing cutbacks over the next years. Augustana Chaplaincy is in part funded through a partnership with the University and thus we are experiencing part of this decrease in funding. While the amount is quite substantial university wide, the specific impact on Chaplaincy will not change the quality of programming that we provide to the students. We are dedicated to accompanying the Augustana community on a pilgrimage of educating the whole person – mind, body, and spirit.

Lutheran Campus Ministry-Edmonton – The Rev. Richard Reimer

In 2016, Lutheran Campus Ministry-Edmonton received notice of a generous bequest from the estate of long-time friend, Beverley Boren. With the first installment of that gift, LCM-Edmonton has established a permanent endowment with the Edmonton Community Foundation in her honour.

Known as the "Bev Boren Lutheran Campus Ministry Fund," interest will be disbursed annually to reflect Bev's desire to support campus ministry personnel and programming carried

out by Lutheran Campus Ministry, University of Alberta, Edmonton. God bless you, Bev! God bless your memory!

Last year, at the invitation of the Forum for Theological Exploration (FTE), Atlanta, Georgia, I attended a North American Consultation on Intentional Christian Communities. This concluded with the invitation to write a grant proposal for up to \$10,000. My proposal was to grow student community that practices discerning and responding to Christ's call to ministry through retreats, book study, and spiritual direction.

The Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow, Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, and I designed two day long-retreats bringing together the intentional Christian communities of Martin Luther House and St. Aidan's House (Anglican) at Mulhurst Lutheran Camp.

We began with the practice of "Dwelling in the Word," reflecting on where God's mission is unfolding in the world, and where we may join it. Dr. Faith Nostbakken, Diaconal Minister, joined us to introduce spiritual direction and led us in drawing our prayers through a mandala. Chef Dana Rayment cooked marvelous meals! The grant also funded the annual student winter retreat at Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake. At the weekly supper and meeting facilitated by Chaplains Richard Reimer, at Martin Luther House, and Sarah Holmstrom, at St. Aidan's House, residents have been given and are reading together, Called to Community: The Life Jesus Wants for His People. With gratitude we acknowledge the FTE grant that has made the growth we have experienced possible!

This past year the Lutheran Student Movement's (LSM) theme has been "Serving in the Spirit", focusing on a different fruit of the Spirit each month, including love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal. 5:22). Special highlights of this past year include LSM's annual hotdog sale through which six hundred dollars was raised for the Red Cross to assist flood victims in Asia. Other activities included participation in Lutheran Campus Ministry's Skate-A-Thon and the Prayerworks inner city meal program.

We are especially grateful to local congregations including Holy Spirit, Mount Zion, Ascension, and Hosanna, who have nourished LSM in both body and spirit by providing meals and cookies throughout the year. In the midst of the turbulent environment of academia, LSM ministers to the campus community by welcoming students from all walks of life to be part of a Christian community.

Martin Luther House provides a "home away from home" and intentional Christian community to five students. Residents reach out to the wider student community by opening their doors for Tuesday suppers hosted by the Lutheran Student Movement. On Sunday evenings residents join the Anglican student community for "The Worship Room" at St. George's Anglican Church located right by the campus. NAIT Campus Ministry - The Rev. Jason Anderson Things are always great at NAIT... mostly because that rhymes, but so does commiserate, and we probably all sympathize with plentiful vineyards but too few laborers. I continue serving Lutheran Campus Ministry 4hrs a week as one of many ecumenical chaplains. Together, we ensure NAIT has full time chaplaincy services. In good Lutheran prudence, I am now able to provide worship (prayer, word, sacrament) to our students. With this, in addition to everything else going on: community-building events, faith mentoring, spiritual care/counseling, and premarital counseling, students are able to find spiritual security and well-being as they journey through their education with various joys and challenges. What's most special to me is being an extension of our church, creating a space for young people to encounter Christ incarnate: in their lives, in their communities, among their peers, where they are at emotionally and physically, in the context of their intense learning and professional formation. Thanks to NAIT and the department of Student Counseling for being champions of campus ministry, to our Synod, all its members, to Lutheran Triune Educational and Benevolent Society, for the support that makes this all happen.

The Synod Campus Ministry Team welcomes your partnership in the gospel. Thanks for your ongoing support via Synod Benevolence, Directed Giving and especially through your support for Campus Ministry's "SMART" Sunday, held each September.

Mark Kuntz served with me on the Youth Ministry Team from 2015-2017 and together we achieved **two of the Ministry Team's** previous goals: to increase the size of the Youth Ministry Team and to create a working list of youth leaders across the Synod. In 2017 when Mark stepped down Wayne Huff, Krystle Plant, Rev. Erik Sorenson and Kyra Van Veen joined me on the team. The entire Team wishes to thank Mark for all his contributions.

Synod Youth Gathering

The Synod youth gathering, *Freely Given*, took place May 5-7, 2017 at Camp Kuriakos, Sylvan Lake, with 47 youth participating (64 participated in total, which included home team leaders, staff, and planning team representing 10 congregations). The gathering was a joint event (as it was in 2015) between the Synod and Kuriakos, Mulhurst and Hastings Lake Lutheran Bible Camps.

The gathering theme reflected the 500th commemoration of the Reformation. The keynote presentations were by Rev. Richard Reimer; drama and Sunday preacher Jacob Rempel; workshop leaders; and gathering band, featuring Andrew Chell, Anna Kochendorfer, Mark Kuntz, Ethan McGhan, lead by Ingrid Parker.

All worked well together in proclaiming the reality of the theme. We were pleased that Bishop Larry was able to join us and to lead a workshop.

National ELCIC Convention 2017

National Youth Gathering

Each gathering is held over five days and includes large group worship, speakers and workshops, excursions, activities and education. Anna Thede, Hosanna Lutheran Edmonton and myself from St. Paul's Lutheran, Ellerslie, Edmonton worked together to coordinate the ABT Synod Pre-Gathering Trip, August 13- 17, 2016 through Nova Scotia prior to the CLAY Gathering in Charlottetown. Much fun was had - highlights of which included a trip to Peggy's Cove, Lunenburg, Tidal Bore rafting, Cow's Ice Cream, a lobster dinner at the Shore club and much more. Approximately 60 youth and leaders attended the ABT Synod Pre-Gathering Trip. Youth and adults were very pleased that Bishop Larry and Cathy were able to join us on the Pre-Gathering trip and CLAY Gathering

2018 CLAY Gathering (Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth) is being held August 15-19 in Thunder Bay, ON, with the theme of "Threads". The ABT Synod Pre-Gathering Bus Trip there and back is being planned by Krystle Plant of Hosanna Lutheran, Edmonton, along with myself for August 11-21, from Edmonton to Thunder Bay and back. The trip will be through the prairies with various stops along the way

ABT Synod Youth Gathering 2019. We are planning the next gathering to be held at Hastings Lake Lutheran Bible Camp May 3-5, 2019.

Synod Youth Ministry Team goals for the future;

Worship and the Arts Ministry Team

"Many and great, O God, are your works . . . with you are found the true gifts that last." ELW 837

Our synod's Worship and the Arts Committee, which usually meets twice a year, currently has three members: Bishop Larry Kochendorfer (Synod office); Colleen McGinnis (Wetaskiwin) – secretary; editor of the *Adoramus* newsletter; Carolyn Ethier (Lethbridge) – chair and ABT representative on the ELCIC National Program Committee for Worship.

The year following our 2016 Synod Convention has been one

of collaboration with other ministry teams.

- We partnered with C.A.RE to create worship resources, including liturgy, music and sermon, for use by congregations observing Mental Health Sunday in 2017.
- We assisted Leadership Development in designing the March Congregational Life Event, which included workshops with some of the people who helped shape our last convention worship:
 - Proclamation with Power: Proclaiming the word of scripture with intentionality and authenticity – Rev. Dr. Laura Holck;
 - Words for Worship Rev. Daranne Harris;
 - This is the Night! [Easter vigil] Robyn Simpson-Mohr and Rev. Kristian Wold;
 - o plus, a worship resource table Carolyn Ethier)

We celebrate, too, the many worship events planned by others beyond our group. As part of Reformation 500 commemorations, ecumenical expressions of the *Liberated by God's Grace* hymn festival have been hosted around the synod. Lutherans and others also came together for the excellent *Music that Makes Community* workshop that took place in Calgary in the summer of 2017.

On the synod website, a new *Adoramus* newsletter was published in fall 2017, as was the current *weekly diary of prayers and intercessions* for congregations and ministries of the Church; congregations are invited to include these public intercessions in their weekly worship. Most recently, we have enjoyed coordinating worship planning for the 2018 Synod Convention.

We want to highlight four key worship-related supports from the national church:

- Through the work of the ELCIC's Program Committee for Worship, a sermon-sharing program developed by the BC Synod has been expanded for use by congregations without a full-time minister. Information is available through the synod office.
- The Program Committee for Worship also commissioned Where Two or Three Are Gathered: Worship for Small Assemblies, a series of worship plans using Evangelical Lutheran Worship as the primary resource. The worship outlines include options for Holy Communion and Service of the Word

each week. They have been posted on http://www.worship.ca/ by season: Advent resources (Michèle Barr, MNO), Epiphany (Kathryn Smith, Eastern Synod), Lent (Carolyn Ethier, ABT), and Easter (Lorraine Reinhardt, BC).

- To assist congregations in preparing Sunday worship bulletins, the ELCIC now produces our church bulletin series, available through http://churchbulletins.ca/ Last fall, people were invited to contribute images of doors and windows that look out and see in, evoking the mission we all share. These images have been featured as bulletin covers for the 2017-2018 liturgical year.
- The National Anglican/Lutheran Worship Conference, "Sing, Pray, Presence, in response to disasters," acknowledges the experience of communities large and small to storms, fires, earthquakes, and violence. How can worship be a community resource and response? The event happens July 16-19, 2018 in Victoria, BC. The National Worship Conference website has details: http://www.nationalworshipconference.org/

SECTION D- REPORTS OF THE OFFICERS AND COUNCIL COMMITTEES

As trustees of the synod (Bylaws, Part VII), the synod council supervises and evaluate the mission and ministry of the synod. This section describes how these duties are carried out and the results of these actions.

Chairperson's Report

As I prepared to write this report, three things came to mind. The first is the wonderful stories that members of Synod Council invariably share during 'check in' time at the beginning of each retreat; you really do hear how God is working in our lives. The second is the feeling I get when we use *Holden Evening Prayer* for our evening worship. There's something about singing that liturgy, in the evening, at a camp setting, that just ignites my spirit. Lastly, at the end of the first retreat I chaired, The Venerable Alan T. Perry, Executive Archdeacon of the Diocese of Edmonton, was asked to give some concluding remarks as our Anglican Observer. He used the phrases - Welcome, Worship, and Work to capture what he had observed over the course of our time together.

It is with those words that I would like to welcome you to this convention and to my report as Chair of Synod Council. I know that the planning team has planned faith-filled worship throughout the convention, and, since members in convention is the highest authoritative body of our Synod, we will report to you on the work we have done over the last two years.

My report focuses on four areas: Synod Council, retreat work, business work and leadership.

As Synod Council we conduct most of our business at our retreats. Retreats are a combination of worship, work, and getting to know each other through our social times. We use our Bible camps as our meeting sites and Cathy Kochendorfer is our 'chef de extraordinaire' going above and beyond with her culinary expertise. We meet over three days and usually have a large agenda to get through. Through our camp chaplain we participate in Dwelling in the Word each day and have Holden Evening Prayer and eucharist each evening. Your Synod Councillors are very dedicated and faith-filled and help us immensely to do our work. I will not mention them by name in my report; you will find them listed in other parts of the convention docket. But I

do want to thank them for their work. They are wonderful to work with! I do however want to particularly thank Marilyn Murray who has been our Synod secretary for many years. She has completed her terms and is not eligible for reelection. Thank you, Marilyn, for your meticulous note taking for us; it has been a pleasure working with you.

I also want to welcome Paul Ellison as our Synod Treasurer and thank him for volunteering under very sad circumstances.

I continue to challenge myself and Synod Councillors to improve communication to the congregations and members in our Areas. We still have a communication gap between the important work we do compared to what the local congregation knows and hears about. We constantly need to address the question; "What does the Synod do for us?"

Another important part of our Synod work involves those involved at Synod Council Retreats. National Bishop Susan participates regularly and not only brings news from the national level of our church but also presents sessions when asked such as the Gender Justice Policy. Our two National Church Council members, Rev. Dr. James Hendricksen and Les Pearson are also regularly involved and serve as communication links to the National Church. We have had Jeff Pym, Director of ELFEC (Evangelical Lutheran Foundation of Eastern Canada) present to us as a follow up to our Ponder Anew activity. We have also kept our focus on the TRC outcomes by having Fiona Brownlee report on the work she is doing. Fiona is the Rural Indigenous Communities Liaison for the Anglican Diocese of Edmonton. We also viewed and discussed the film *Treaty* 107 which documents the story of how Lutherans and Mennonites in Laird, Saskatchewan came together with the young Chippewayan First Nations Band to address the wrongs committed over land claims. In addition to speakers and presentations we receive information from Bishop Larry on the progress made by our various ministry teams and groups.

The business work of the Synod consumes much of our time, but it is important and vital to the work of the Synod. I want to focus on four current areas. A new focus has been the focus on the new idea of Areas and on the Area Leadership Teams appointed to oversee them. The concept of areas has much potential for good work, but it is still early in the transition from the conference 'thinking' to areas. I know that the ALT's are meeting and planning activities, establishing communication and contact links and figuring out who they are and what their needs are. I pray that things go well for them and firmly believe in the adage of TEAM – Together Everyone Achieves More.

One area of our ongoing work is the work on Missional Formation. Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow continues to lead congregations into this process as well as guide those congregations who are in various stages of the process of becoming more missional. There have been some success stories of this work as you will see through the video series that has been developed for this convention. Some congregations are doing exciting things when they stop to determine where God is leading them into their neighbourhoods. Much of this work has been a continuation of the ideas you shared through the post it notes at the last convention when you shared your ideas on two questions: I am hearing God say to us..... and, I sense that one of the places the Spirit is inviting our Synod to join with God in God's work is? Some very good work has been initiated through the ideas you have shared.

An important piece of Council's work is the area of governance and operating as a governance board for the Synod. In that role we carry out two important practices at each retreat. One is that we review some of our policies to ensure that we are 'in compliance' with the spirit of the policy. The other aspect of this is that we review some policies to determine if the policy still guides our actions in the current realities or if it needs to be changed or updated. As part of this last function, we are bringing to you a revised set of missional priorities that will guide us for the next three years. Our four main themes to the priorities have not changed but some changes have been made to wording of existing priorities and some new priorities have been added to better reflect the needs of our Synod. Please take the time to read, study and pray about them as we will be asking for your approval of them.

The last area I would like to comment on involves the leadership of our Synod. At our last retreat, Synod Council received the findings from the Bishop's Review Committee. Responses were received from a wide variety of respondents and were overwhelmingly positive concerning the work and leadership of our Bishop! Thank you, Bishop Larry, for your leadership and the caring you show for each one of us, whether rostered, diaconal or lay. We are your flock and we will follow your leading. Bishop Larry has a wonderful supporting cast in the Synod Office, and so to Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, the Rev. Dr. Julianne Barlow; to Darla Wildfang, Executive Assistant; to Sheryl Burry, Bookkeeper; to Wendy Grosfield, ABT Editor of Canada Lutheran and our Convention Manager; to Rev. Gary Nickel our Necrologist and Archivist; to Bishop Don Sjorberg, retired, Consultant Related to Church Property and Dissolution of Congregations; to Diaconal Minister Faith Nostbakken, Ecumenical Officer - North and to Rev. Daranne Harris, Ecumenical Officer - South; the five Area Deans: Rev Trish Schmermund, Rev. Julianna Wehrfritz-Hanson, Rev. Kathy Calkins, Rev. Jeff Decelle, and Rev. Kevin Powell, along with the many who serve on Synod Committees, thank you all for the faithful work you do for the Synod of Alberta and the Territories. It is much appreciated.

Mission Priorities and Outcomes 2018-2021

Reflecting our mission statement, our vision and the Evangelical Declaration, the proposed mission priorities and outcomes for the triennium 2018-2021 are:

- SPIRIT-LED LEADERSHIP is characterized by discerning where God might be leading us and by trust in the Holy Spirit who "calls us through the Gospel, enlightens us with gifts, sanctifies and keeps us in true faith."
 - a. Listening and discernment are modelled by enabling leaders to cultivate a vision for mission and use the gifts entrusted to them by the Holy Spirit.
 - b. Lay and rostered leaders are equipped and empowered to practice the disciplines of

Treasurer's Report

Financial highlights

Dear Friends in Christ.

As many of you are aware, much has happened in the last few months at the Synod. Specifically related to the Treasurer position, we have all been saddened and deeply affected by the passing of Stephen Wildfang in March of 2018. Stephen devoted over 27 years of service as Treasurer of the Synod and had a deep-rooted knowledge of everything pertaining to the position. As a result of the timing of his passing there are some items which have not been completed in time for this written report.

In the past, Stephen put many hours into preparing the drafted financial statements together for the auditors to report on. This year, the auditors have had the additional task of preparing the financial statements before preparing an audited report. As such, at the time I am writing this, the 2017 audited financial statements have not been completed in their entirety. Synod Council has approved the 2016 audited financial statements however, the 2017 audited financials will need to be approved by Synod Council prior to the convention. They will then be posted on the Synod website with the already posted Bulletin of Reports. At convention I will be able to provide details of the 2017 audited reports.

There are however, some items that I wish to bring to your attention:

- Due to the decreased Benevolence in 2017 as compared to 2016, salaries for Synod Staff were frozen at 2017 levels for the 2018 calendar year.
- Due to limited information and the given circumstances, Council Executive have agreed not to prepare a 2019 operating budget until all relevant information is available. The 2019 operating budget will be approved by Synod Council in the fall of 2018 at the Synod Council's regular meeting. It is expected that the budget will remain similar to prior years taking into account the decrease in Benevolence receipts expected. It should be noted that there is no requirement that an operating budget be presented for the convention
- Registration fees for the 2019 ELCIC National Convention are expected to be \$30,100 which is only a \$900 increase from 2017. Additionally, our Synod will elect one more rostered leader to the 2019 ELCIC National Convention (15 Lay, 2 Youth, 11 Rostered Ministers)

- Synod Council wishes to extend a Thank You to the five Areas within the Synod for continuing to gather and forward funds to the Synod to offset the cost for the National Conventions. Following the 2018 synod convention, and the 2019 national convention, we will enter a three-year cycle for conventions (2021 synod convention and 2022 national convention) which will mean an additional year to gather funds for the national convention.

As the new Treasurer I would ask that you keep me in your prayers during this time of time of transition.

Section 3.	The convention of this synod following 2016 shall be in 2018.
Section 4.	The terms of all officers, synod council members, and Lutheran Theological Seminary representatives elected at convention in 2018 shall be three years.
Section 5.	The convention of this synod following 2018 shall be in 2021.
Section 6.	The term of the bishop of this synod elected in 2018 shall be six years.

Report of Archivist

Our Archives begin when the Responsible Person in the parish records information and continues when one takes care of those records, Minutes, photos, or saved old documents locally. Questions to consider are:

- Are all of your most important Archives stored in a safe and fireproof manner?
- Are you interested in down-sizing some of these materials? Consider "archiving" some of the most un-needed of what you have. Several congregations have done so recently.

Church Councils share the management responsibility for keeping the records and history of their church together with the Pastor. Also, remember that lay designated people with the right abilities can be authorized to do the actual recording and bookkeeping. When is the last time that a review was made at your congregation to see if everything is as it should be? How about that suggestion for fireproof storage that has been floating around off and on over the years – for those most valuable records? The church building can burn down and be replaced, but how about your Master Records?

Computer records were once planned to be the easiest and most permanent format for archival materials such as Master Records of members of parishes. Today, computers are increasingly being used for managing most parish activities and programs and do save time. It is important, however, to keep backups of all pertinent data on an external backup drive (to be stored in a secure and fire-proof location), or a cloud account located in Canada. It is also your responsibility to keep software up to date in case of computer failure, so information can be transferred to a new machine, as computers can be compromised, or hardware drives no longer be available to function to retrieve recorded information, etc. As a result, paper and pen continue to also be an approved and acceptable standard to record essential membership and related information, preferably in the traditional bound books, as long as they are kept in a secure location that is fire-proof. Whatever the method your congregation employs, it is important to be mindful of people's personal information, and to maintain confidentiality. Records should be able to be easily accessed only by those with authority to do so.

There also comes a time when some congregations close or when committees or church groups disband. Then it may be a good time to send their stuff to a secure, safe depository. If a congregation closes, consider making a copy of Master Records about members and deposit them with a nearby parish for those individuals in the future who may be looking for personal information.

The Synod Archivist can help with all of this. Most of our kept materials go to the Provincial Archives in Edmonton [780/427-1750 or 310-0000, or contact them via their website].

As Archivist, I continue to receive archival materials from several congregations including some which have closed or are in the process of closing, as well as 2-3 inquiries or requests for personal religious records or information each month. I continue to be a member of the religious-based Alberta archivists group.

As Archivist, I also occasionally receive books, manuals, and materials from pastors or parishes that are downsizing or from "estates", and a few years ago established the present form of book table arrangement at our Synod Convention for such stuff that is still current and useful. Items placed there are available for free on the table to those who can use them, and the remainder goes to the Seminary Library for their consideration, and that remainder goes on to seminarians who would like to have them.

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Keeping in mind the comforts from the message of Christ and Easter, we remember since the lead-up to the 2016 Synod Convention, these Servants, and keep their loved ones in our thoughts and prayers:

Pr. ALLEN JOHAN SEVERSON, 88, died 16 July 2016 in Camrose AB. Born on the home farm north of Sedgwick AB and baptized and confirmed in Bethania/Sedgwick, Allen attended local schools including graduation from Camrose

Lutheran College in 1946. His studies continued at Canadian Lutheran Bible Institute in Camrose, and Lutheran Theological Seminary (LTS), Saskatoon in 1947. He graduated from University of Saskatoon in 1951 and Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon in 1952. Ordained in 1952, he moved to Birch Hills/Birch Hills SK 1952-56, then was Dean of the Bible Department of Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute/Outlook SK 1956-58, where he married Mary nee Sundby in 1957. They moved to Dunbar/Vancouver BC 1958-63, St. Olaf/Kindersly SK 1963-67, Edberg/Edberg and Bethesda/New Norway and Sharon/Donalda and Bethany/rural Donalda AB 1967-73, then to Chaplain/Bethany Homes and Hospital/Camrose AB 1973-89, when he took early retirement due to heart attacks. Allen was able to continue enjoying preaching part time after retirement in the central region of AB for many years.

Pr. HAROLD ERIKSSON, died 19 September 2016 in Red Deer AB. Born in Hughenden AB and "schooled in Alberta". his studies continued at the University and the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon. Harold shared being among the first Augustana pastors to "have all our education" and be ordained in Canada" [1952]. He married "Peggy" nee Lee in 1949 in Saskatoon, and they were together until she died in 1994. They moved to parishes of: Salem/Scandia and Faith/Rolling Hills AB 1952-56, Immanuel/New Westminster BC 1956-60, Theodore/Buchanan SK 1960-64, Faith/Atikokan ON 1964-69, St. John/Shellbrook and Zion/Canwood and Leask SK 1969-76, First United/Flin Flon [and St. John/Snow Lake for several of these years MB 1976-86, Grace/Bentley AB 1986-88, and retirement, which was followed by Bethany/Dickson AB 1989, Valley/Eastend SK 1990, and Christ/Sexsmith AB 1991. Harold continued active ministry with Interim Ministry and Pastoral Supply opportunities for many years, serving at various times: Our Saviour's/Regina SK, Shepherd of the Hills/Calgary AB, and several vacant parishes including an LC-C congregation where he provided Holy Communion. Harold was also a Naval Reserve Chaplain who served summers in either the West or East Coast for many years, and was one of 5 Lutheran pastors in Manitoba with current pilots licenses in the 1980s [the "Luther-Waffe"]. He regularly "flew from Flin Flon to Snow Lake for a 9am worship service and then back to Flin Flon for the 11am service" in his own plane.

Pr. LEWIS MARTIN BOOTH, 90, died 13 October 2016 in Moose Jaw SK. Born at the family farm near Southey SK., at age 17 he enlisted in the RCAF, training as a pilot and was honorably discharged as Sergeant in 1945. He worked for Eaton's, as a carpenter, in electronics, and for the CP Railroad. Lew had his own electronics business and in 1981 closed his business so that he and his wife Dorothea [married in 1953] could move to Saskatoon to attend the Lutheran Theological Seminary and he became a Licensed Lay Minister in 1982. He then served Emmaus/Edmonton AB 1982, Norman Wells Mission/Norman Wells NWT 1983-84,

and Prince of Faith/Calgary AB 1984-85, Emmanuel/Calgary AB 1985-86, Bethany/Lomond and Hope/Milo AB 1986-93. Lew semi-retired in 1993 and moved back to his house in Moose Jaw SK where he continued to serve as pulpit supply and did the radio broadcast "Back to God Hour" for Central Lutheran. He was ordained at age 70 and then "moved with Dorothy by his side" to St. Paul's/Herbert and Peace/Rush Lake SK 2000-03; he also served Gravelbourg Federated Lutheran Parish: St. Paul/Gravelbourg and Trinity/Mossbank SK 2001-02. He semi-retired again in 2003 around the time of Dorothy's death, but continued to provide pulpit supply to Peace/Rush Lake until 2012.

TAMARA GAERTNER, 95, died 6 November 2016 in Kelowna BC. Her travels in life took her to many locations where "she enjoyed expressing her faith and sharing it with others". "Her husband Fred pastored for over 50 years, serving in St. John/Oliver BC, and over 10 parishes in the prairie provinces", including St. John/Wetaskiwin AB 1948-52, and organized Grace/Ponoka AB on 27 May 1952.

Pr. MILTON RUDE, 90, died 15 January 2017 in Camrose AB. He was born in an ambulance in Minnesota and his family moved to Armena, AB in 1940. He graduated from Camrose Lutheran College in 1945 and went to Luther Theological Seminary in Saskatoon from 1947-51. His first parish was First Saskatchewan, Langham, SK 1951-54, where he married Gladys (nee Wig) in 1954. They moved in 1954, to serve at Trinity, Grande Prairie, then to Trinity, Calgary; and on to Peace, Vernon, BC, leaving in 1978; then to Victory, Medicine Hat from 1978-90, and Bethel, Ryley and Holden, Holden from 1990-93, when he retired. For many years they were active in Messiah's Mission Committee in Camrose, as well as with ABT Synod world missions concerns. Milton was talented in carpentry and related skills and loved being a part of three parishes which had major building projects.

Pr. CARL E. JOHNSON, 95, died 29 March 2017 in New Westminster BC, having celebrated his 65th Anniversary of Ordination a few months earlier. After graduating in 1951 from Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon, ordination followed the same year. He was married to Renata and they moved to parishes in: St. John/Strasbourg [Lunner and Norrona missions] and St. Olaf/Govan SK 1951-54, Grace/Dawson Creek and Peace/Fort St. John and Doe Creek/North Rolla and Montney/Montney BC 1954-57. Carl then taught at Canadian Lutheran Bible Institute/Camrose AB 1958-60. Parish work continued in: Camrose [now Messiah]/Camrose AB 1960-66; Trinity/Burns Lake BC, and Fraser Lake & Houston & Smithers BC which became Faith/Fraser Lake and Mt. Zion/Smithers BC 1966-68, Peace/Fort St. John and Montney/Montney BC 1968-73. Mt. Zion/New Westminster BC 1973-82, Salem/Scandia and Ibbestad/Enchant AB 1982-84, and Sunshine Coast Missions BC 1984-86, with retirement in BC.

Pr. DONALD L. MILLER, 88, died 7 August 2017 in Selkirk MB. Before he entered pastoral ministry, his sister Mary Lou and he performed as "The Curtis Twins", dancing at nightclubs throughout Pennsylvania and New York City, with Gene Kelly one of their teachers. Don studied at Augustana College in Rock Island IL and continued at the Lutheran Seminary there, graduating in 1958. He served a parish first in Oregon, but fell in love with Canada and was subsequently called to Emmanuel/Meeting Creek and Saron/Clive AB 1962-66, then to Bethel/Camrose and Wilhelmina/Hay Lakes AB 1966-72, with his wife Phyllis. He moved to St. Mark's/Winnipeg MB in 1972. He married Theresa nee Hammarstrand in 1977, and "with his beloved help-mate" Terry, Don served many Winnipeg and rural Manitoba congregations over their 37-year marriage". Cottage life followed retirement.

Pr. JOHN EDWARD FULLMER, 94, died 12 August 2017 in Kenora ON. Born in Indiana, he joined the army in WW2, was captured during the "Battle of the Bulge" and interned in prison camp (Stalag IVB) near Dresden, Germany from Dec. 21,1944 - May 13, 1945. After his release, John began his post-secondary education, receiving Bachelor degrees from Carthage College in Illinois and Marion College in Indiana, and a Bachelor of Divinity from Pacific Lutheran Seminary in Berkeley, California. John married Azalee on April 11, 1954 and began over 63 years of marriage and over 60 years of ministry starting in Washington State. In November 1956, the family immigrated to Canada to Gimli area congregations/Gimli MB 1956-60; he was the first pastor of Lutheran Church of the Cross/Calgary AB 1960-63; then on to Evansburg Mission/Evansburg and St. Paul's/Rosevear AB 1964-66; and finally to Bethesda/Kenora and Trinity/Bergland ON. John spent most of his Ontario ministry as a mission pastor with First Nations peoples in the Treaty 3 Kenora area, working out of Bethesda/Kenora. He "was passionate about his time spent with First Nations people and started the Amik Association which funded employment projects for the local Treaty Three Communities. He and others were involved in helping in the revival of the POW WOW movement in Kenora and surrounding area in the early 1970's, and was instrumental in working behind the scenes to bring about a peaceful resolution to the Anishinawbe Park Occupation in 1974." "He did not care about the colour of one's skin or the amount of money they had and knew when it was time to talk and respected times not to talk. He had magic and sometimes the magic worked and sometimes it didn't [his favourite saying, from Chief Dan George in the movie "Little Big Man."]."

Pr. HERMAN TIEN CHIU LIU, 87, died 16 September 2017 in Edmonton AB. Born in Hubei Province, China in 1929, his defining story from childhood was a fire in 1935 that destroyed his parents' house and business. Five-year-old Herman, left behind in the fire, was rescued when he was swept up in a

pile of blankets by a neighbour who had run into the fire to see what he could rescue. "He later believed that this was the hand of God sparing him for some greater purpose in life. Life was difficult after the fire: his family's business was destroyed, his father died in poverty a year later, and his mother could not afford to send him to elementary school for more than eight months." By the late 1940s, his mother and a beloved sister had died, his other siblings had departed for work or family, and "he was drawn to church to console his spirit, where it was warmed by song and by the message of God's love and was baptized in 1949 in a Chinese Lutheran Church in mainland China." In 1950, fearing the Communist regime, Herman fled for Hong Kong. "A Lutheran missionary took Herman under his wing and he began Bible studies in earnest under the missionary's guidance. One day he witnessed a fatal accident and remembered the words he had just read that morning: "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" (Mark 8:36-37). From that moment the Holy Spirit opened the meaning of those verses to Herman and he decided to offer his life for His Gospel." He graduated from Hong Kong Lutheran Theological Seminary in 1956, Chung Chi College/Chinese University of Hong Kong in 1964, and Haw Kiu College in 1972, serving in several churches in Hong Kong and preaching at Lutheran Church of Hong Kong, as evangelist in charge of the Leprosy Mission at the Lord's Willing Church, and Chaplain & Welfare Assistant of Fanling Hospital. A dedicated theological scholar, in 1972 he came to Canada to study at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon and received a Master of Divinity in 1974. During his studies, he also had the vision to start a Chinese Lutheran ministry in Canada, later moving to start New Life Chinese Lutheran Church/Vancouver BC 1974-84, as well as being the first Chinese pastor to be ordained into the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada. Moving with his wife Eunice to Edmonton, he started New Life Chinese Lutheran Church/Edmonton AB 1984-92. "The name "New Life" was chosen for his congregations as a reminder that "through Christ we are born again and can serve him in gladness"."

Pr. PETER ANTHONY GRUNDLER, 57, died 14 October 2017. Born in Vancouver, BC, he attended the University of Alberta where he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1984, and graduated from Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon SK, with ordination in 1988. He and wife, Sandra, moved to Zion/Athabasca and Golgotha/Ellscott AB 1988-1995, and then Lord of Life/Edmonton AB 1995-2014, before he became Chaplain at Glenrose Rehabilitation Hospital in Edmonton AB. His good sense of humor included the Sunday the acolyte set his robe on fire while leaning over to light the pascal candle: "I grabbed him on the sleeve that was burning and put out the fire, but have a permanent keepsake of the event on the palm of my hand. I give thanks to God for the many and various ways God works through the simple words and actions we offer in ministry."

Dr. DORIS NELSON, 91, died 4 November 2017 in Edmonton AB. She felt the Call and was Commissioned as a World **Missions Missionary to the Lutheran Church's work overseas.** With her medical studies and experience, Doris moved to Africa, and served in Lutheran medical missions work in Zululand, South Africa 1954-79. Her work began with training nurses and concluded as matron in Charge of the hospital at Ntunjambili, Natal, South Africa. Later she returned to Canada and at age 50, graduated and began practicing as a Medical Doctor.

GRETCHEN WOOLERY, 69, died 4 December 2017 in Calgary AB. Gretch, wife of Pr. Lee Woolery, "loved her family, her number one priority in everything she did. Not just those born into it, but also those many friends she met along the way; whether at the church, Hastings Lake Bible Camp, Samaritan's Purse, Bible Study or the neighbours next door." She and Lee moved to a congregation in North Dakota and then Bawlf/Skudesness and Zion/Bawlf AB 1979-84, Lakeland Parish/Bonnyville & Grand Centre & Cold Lake AB 1984-1986, Trinity/Westlock AB 1986-90, Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute/Outlook SK 1990-95, Mount Olivet/Sherwood Park AB 1995-2000, Resurrection/Saskatoon SK 2000-04, and Lutheran Church of Our Saviour/Calgary AB from 2004. "Through her entire life serving her Lord she was shaped into the loving, compassionate and beautiful person she was."

Pr. JOHANN (JOHN) KUNKEL, 91, died 16 December 2017 in Winnipeg MB. Together with his wife Elisabeth, they moved to parishes in Duncan BC, Good Shepherd/Meadow Lake SK, Zion/Golden Spike AB, and St. John/Rosenfeld MB. He and his wife were Commissioned World Missions Missionaries to Bong Mine, Liberia, West Africa, 1963-72, where the ministry grew from work with expatriates and a nearby community of faith to include 21 congregations among the peoples of the area and ministering together with several Evangelists, Catechists, and Lay Worship Leaders. They returned to Canada to St. Stephen's/Winnipeg MB 1972-81, and then St. John's/Winnipeg MB 1981-91. "His life was dedicated to inclusive public and parish service, centred on fairness and equality."

RUTH OINE HAGEN, 96, died 25 February 2018 in Camrose AB. Born in rural Saskatchewan, she became very proficient at sewing and gardening, skills which she carried throughout her life. She attended SLBI [the future LCBI] in Outlook, and after graduation and further secretarial training in Saskatoon, returned to SLBI and became the school secretary, with full responsibility for running the "Sunday School by Mail" program. While at Outlook, she met the love of her life, Arnold Hagen. They were married August 21, 1946 and moved to Saskatoon where Arnold attended seminary. Upon Arnold's graduation, they moved to Prince Albert SK, and then to Vancouver to pastor at First Lutheran/Vancouver BC 1952-62. After Arnold's call to CLBI in 1962, the family moved to

Camrose where they have resided up to the present. "The skills acquired while she lived on the farm proved useful while managing the family, an outside job, and participating at CLBI." Upon Arnold's retirement, they traveled to many countries and destinations, often in the line of ministry until Arnold died in 2014. "Ruth was a devoted Christian wife, mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother but the most important part of her life was her relationship with Jesus. She is remembered for being a prayer warrior." Ruth's last years were at Bethany Meadows Care Home.

CAROLYN MARIE JACOBSON, 73, died 22 March 2018 in central Alberta. Born and raised in Montana, Carolyn nee Wall attended college in Billings MT, and later the University of Alberta in Edmonton, and married Rev. Joseph Robert Jacobson in 1965. Alberta was home to Carolyn and Joseph for their 52 years of marriage. From 1965 to 1985 they were at Lutheran parishes in Westlock, Calgary, Camrose, and Donalda. From 1985 to 1994 they resided in Edmonton while Joseph served as Bishop of the Alberta and Territories Synod of the ELCIC. In 1994 they retired for the first time to their little farm east of Bashaw. They were received into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church in 2000, and Joseph was ordained a Catholic Deacon and Priest in 2007, for service in the Archdiocese of Grouard-McLennan. They moved to McLennan where Carolyn served as organist at the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist while Joseph served as Chancellor of the Archdiocese and Parochial Vicar of the Cathedral Parish. In 2014 they retired for the second time back to the farm. "Carolyn's love of people and her deep commitment to working for their well-being were inspired in her by God's love for her and for all of His children revealed in Jesus Christ. The various situations in which she found herself throughout her married life as spouse, partner in ministry, mother, grandmother, teacher, musician, watercolor artist, refugee sponsor, and home-maker offered her many opportunities to express that love".

Pr. LARRY SOVERAN, 80, died 2 April 2018 in Camrose AB. Born in Assiniboia SK., he joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and worked as a radar technician in Europe, returning to attend the University of Saskatchewan and later the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Saskatoon. Larry and Marilylle (nee Pattison) were married and they moved to the parish of Weldon/Weldon SK 1966-71, then to Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd/Selkirk MB 1971-77, Peace/Innisfail AB 1977-86, and Bashaw/Bashaw AB 1986-2002 with retirement following by Little Beaver Lake.

Pr. DYANNA MARIE COUTURE, 34, died 7 April 2018 in Standard AB. Born in Camrose AB, Dyanna (nee Noble) met Richard, the love of her life, in 2009 and they married on 1 January 2014. "She ventured on her path in life with the study of law but after a brief period, got a higher calling because she knew for certain she was meant to be a Minister." Dyanna was ordained in 2014, and she and Richard moved first to

Trinity/Warburg and then Nazareth/Standard AB 2014-18. She especially liked to "guide through her work with the young hearts in Sunday School and through the sermon." "When she was not helping others, she enjoyed crocheting and challenging herself to see what crocheting project she could accomplish." Dyanna particularly liked Micah 6:8, "O people, the Lord has told you what is good, and this is what he requires of you: to do what is right, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God".

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Congregation Constitutional Review Committee

The Congregational Constitutional Review Committee is a standing committee of the Synod Council and consists of a member appointed from Synod Council, plus two appointed/volunteer members at large, as well as Assistant to the Bishop for Mission, Rev. Dr. Juliane Barlow, who serves as the Synod Liaison. Its function is to receive, review, make recommendations, and/or approve requests from congregations for changes to their constitutions.

Since last convention we have dealt with approximately fifteen ongoing or new requests for constitutional changes.

Changes to their constitutions in 2017 were approved for:

- Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Cross, Calgary -Dec. 2016
- Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Cross, Calgary -May 2017
- St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church Ellerslie, Edmonton July 2017

These requests were reviewed, approved and forwarded to the Synod Council for vote.

As of the end of 2017 all congregations are required to use the new ELCIC Model Constitution for Congregations if making changes to their existing constitutions. When requests for change are submitted we also need to have a copy of the current congregational constitution and bylaws for reference.

We would like congregations to review such items as: quorum for AGMs or congregational meetings, number of members on council, age of voting privilege, and other items which would bring your constitution into compliance with the current legislation and policy.

If your congregation is needing to update your constitution we encourage you to contact Synod office early in the process to expedite and make the procedure as smooth as possible. The committee meets as often as required to review requests

submitted, usually three to four times per year.

Members of the ABT Synod Examining Committee also participate in the Western Synods Examining Committee. Membership consists of the Candidates Synodical Bishop, one representative from each of the four western Synods, and a faculty member from Lutheran Theological Seminary.

The Western Synods Examining Committee met at Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon from March 31-April 1, 2017 to examine Colin Milang, Sarah Mowat, Jailyn Corbin and Bev Swanson, Pastoral Candidates from The Synod of Alberta and the Territories; Aneeta Sarrop Pastoral Candidate from the BC Synod; and Emmanuel Aristide Pastoral Candidate from the Saskatchewan Synod.

The Committee presented recommendations to the respective Synod Councils that each candidate be approved for ordination pending completion of their studies and receipt and acceptance of a call. These were approved by the appropriate Synod Councils.

It is a pleasure to serve on this committee, to see the quality of students who were examined, and we look forward to seeing them serve in their respective Synods.

Candidacy Committee (formerly CTEL)

The Synod of Alberta and the Territories Candidacy Committee (formerly *Committee for Theological Education and Leadership*) works on behalf the church to guide people in ministry choices

which may lead to Ordination as a Pastor or Consecration as a Diaconal Minister.

In the ABT Synod, we are currently relating to two interns, six seminary students, and two other individuals at various points in the registration process. Each committee member maintains contact with one or more students walking with them in the candidacy process. Face-to-face contact with students and interns occurs at least once a year at a fall retreat, now held at Mulhurst Lutheran Camp. Last September the fall retreat was blessed with the presence of Diaconal Minister Karen Wedman and The Rev. Dale Olsen engaging in a discussion on MAID – Medical Assistance in Dying.

The Committee continues to administer the distribution of funds from the Synod's "Support Our Students" fund and from the interest on the Bishop Stephen P. Kristenson Endowment Fund. Both funds grow by donations from individuals and congregations. These funds are a response to a 1998 Synod motion to work towards the goal of paying full tuition fees for all candidates endorsed for studies.

The candidacy committee has been in continued dialogue and discussion on the proposed changes to the candidacy manual. With the Candidacy Manual being approved by the National Church Council, we are currently in the process of making changes on how we function accordingly to reflect it. With so many students "staying home" to take on-line and intensive classes from Lutheran Theological Seminary, the congregation can have a much more regular interaction with them and provide important opportunities that support course work.

Psalm 78:4-7

Recounting. Counting over. Counting again. And again, and again. Like the Count from Sesame Street who always introduced himself the same way, "I am the Count, because I love to count. Wahahahaha!" And so, for the Count, the act of counting, of numbering over, of counting again and again and again, seemed to serve no other purpose than the sheer joy of it - the love of counting. And already we get a sense of why the Psalmist begins here: "We will recount..."

We will count over, we will count again and again and again, we will tell from one generation to the next the praiseworthy deeds, the power of the Lord, the wonderful works God has done. Recount, says the Psalmist, just because we can, just for the sheer joy of hearing over and over again the wonderful works of God! Wahahahaha!

And perhaps that, in itself seems enough. But as we read on, we find that recounting, retelling, again and again and again, has a powerful effect, not only to bring us into joy, but to form and shape and reshape generation after generation. That in the recounting there is power to change us into a people who trust God, who remember God, who keep God's commandments of hope and life—and not only for ourselves, but for generations to come. Like a circle with no beginning or end, to recount is to recall. To recall is to remember. To remember is to know. To know is to tell. To tell is to share the joy. To share the joy is to form future generations and those

around us into a hopeful, trusting, remembering people. And to remember is to recount once more—the wonderful deeds of God in our midst!

Recounting. Listening to each other's stories. It is what the Synod has been encouraging us to do and what we have undertaken as an Area Leadership Team over the past few months. You may have seen Vivian Holtby joining you for worship and conversation on a Sunday morning. Or maybe it was Glen Kneller, or Rev. Erik Sorensen or Aly Bowd joining you for coffee and conversation. If you haven't seen us yet, don't worry. We are on our way. What are these conversations about? Hearing from you what inspires you about life in your community, about the ministry of your congregation. Section E- Partner Reports

Report of the National Bishop

Liberated by God's Grace

Grace and peace to you in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ!

As I think back on the past two years since your last Synod Convention, the first thing that comes to mind is the commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation and the lasting impact it will have on the ELCIC. The commemoration of the Reformation may be officially over but the way it has strengthened our Lutheran identity, the way it brought us together in common witness and service through the Reformation Challenge, and its core message of being Liberated by God's Grace will continue to shape our life together as a church in Canada.

In September of 2017, our National Church Council began working on a new five-year strategic plan. The National Office uses this strategic plan to help shape and focus our work. We are energized by the new four areas of focus in our strategic plan: Reconciled Relationships, One Body Working Together, Courageous Innovation, and Empowered Disciples. I would invite you to look at these four areas and consider how you, your congregation and your community might be engaged in one or more of these priorities.

The following is a small glimpse at the work of the National Office reported around these four new strategic areas, and how we carry out our call to be a church *In Mission for Others*.

Reconciled Relationships

In 2011, the ELCIC made a commitment to promote right and renewed relationships between non-indigenous and Indigenous Peoples within Canada. In July 2015, the ELCIC renewed this commitment to truth, reconciliation and equity by repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery. At this **year's** National Convention delegates welcomed Kaila Johnston, research coordinator for the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation (NCTR). The NCTR opened in the summer of 2015 and was created to preserve the memory of **Canada's** Residential School system and legacy. It is the permanent home for all statements, documents, and other materials gathered by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada (TRC). In her presentation to delegates, Johnston

shared that she is frequently asked what people can to do be involved in reconciliation. She listed several actions of reconciliation, including: "Learn the history of Indigenous and non-indigenous peoples, understand the history and legacy of Residential schools, explore the unique intersections between treaty, constitutional Indigenous and human rights, recognize the rich contributions Indigenous peoples have had to this country, take action to address historical injustices and present-day wrongs, as well as teach others." I encourage you to consider how you and your congregation can learn more about the TRC's 94 Calls to Action and how you can be involved in the important work of reconciliation.

The 2017 ELCIC National Convention affirmed A Statement to Muslims in Canada by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada

(http://elcic.ca/ecumenical/documents/StatementtoMuslimsinCana da bytheEvangelicalLutheranChurchinCanada.pdf) and a new resource titled *Encountering People of Other Faiths—Interfaith Guidelines*

(http://elcic.ca/ecumenical/documents/EncounteringPeopleOfOtherFaiths-InterfaithGuidelines.pdf).

These are important documents for our church given the fact that hate crimes are rising within Canada. Following the January 2017 fatal attack at le Centre Culturel Islamique de Québec, I called on the members of our church to reach out in a genuine expression of love for our neighbour

(http://www.elcic.ca/news.cfm?article=459). I continue to urge you to speak out against all forms of racism and violence against Muslims and to work to build relationships with your interfaith neighbours.

The 500th anniversary of the Reformation provided the opportunity to strengthen relationships with Roman Catholics in Canada and around the world. There were services of Common Prayer co-sponsored by Lutherans and Roman Catholics all across the country, from Whitehorse to Vancouver, Sault Ste. Marie to Halifax. Other events that took place as part of the commemoration of the Reformation gave us the opportunity to strengthen relationships with many of our ecumenical partners. This was evidenced at the 2017 National Convention, where partners from the Canadian Council of Churches, Presbyterian Church in Canada, United Church of Canada, Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, Anglican Church of Canada, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and Mennonite Church Canada participated in an ecumenical panel on the convention floor and then participated in our National Service of Commemoration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation.

At the 2015 National Convention we adopted an "ELCIC Resolution on Climate Justice:" This action expanded the commitments we made in 2007's resolution on the Stewardship of Creation.

Our continued commitment to working for reconciliation with all of creation is done at the congregational level through efforts like the tree-planting component of the Reformation Challenge, and nationally and internationally through work with partners.

One Body Working Together

To be a fully functioning church we need to have effective working relationships between congregations, synods, national church, and national and international partners. The body of Christ is bigger than any one of its component parts.

The Synodical and National Officers met at the beginning of December 2017 to look at ways we can work more closely together. At a time of challenge and opportunities, with fewer resources, we need to work together to set focused priorities that will enhance our ability to fulfill the mission to which God is calling us.

Shared vision and mutual trust is not only important within the church, but also among our church and our various partners. We are currently working towards a new *Memorandum of Understanding* with our partner Canada Lutheran World Relief (CLWR). We give thanks for the wonderful leadership Robert Granke has provided to the organization and offer our prayers on his retirement. At the same time, we welcome Rev. Karin Achtelstetter and look forward to our ongoing partnership in the ministry of CLWR.

In May of 2017, I had the privilege of participating in the global life of our church through The Lutheran World Federation Assembly in Windhoek, Namibia. As we gathered from many churches and countries and spoke and sang in many languages, I was reminded again of how much we gain when we are one body working together.

I was honoured to preside at communion at our Sunday worship service, a global celebration of the reformation anniversary. To look out over the crowd of 10,000 and see Lutherans gathered from around the world, worshipping God, commemorating our shared history, joining with ecumenical partners and celebrating the steps towards reconciliation we have shared, lifting up our shared mission and ministry—it was a spiritual highlight for me!

I had a similar spiritual highlight when I presided at our national commemoration service in July. Seeing our church gathered from across the country along with her ecumenical partners

reminded me of my Windhoek experience. What a joy to feel the Spirit alive and in our midst whether carrying out ministry in our local communities or gathered together at a convention.

Courageous Innovation

We recognize that we are in a time of change and that we are going to need to be flexible and patient with one another as we discover together how God is calling us to be the Lutheran church in Canada at this time.

The ELCIC's Church Extension and Capital Fund (CECF) is in the middle of a five-year initiative where they are doing experimentation to figure out new ways of doing ministry given that the old model of congregational development has proven to be too expensive and/or no longer effective. CECF has provided a total of \$300,000 to each synod for Synod Mission initiatives. Funds will be used for activities that are experimental in spirit and genuinely seek to explore what it means to participate in God's mission in the world today.

We are excited about walking with synods in this process. Each of the synods are allocating their funds in different and creative ways. In your synod, two examples are support for unique Drum, Dine and Discuss event through Campus Ministry at the University of Calgary, and various opportunities for coaching and mentoring lay leadership as we seek to strengthen our habits for empowered discipleship.

Being courageous innovators involves balance—on the one hand we need to remember the boundaries we live in as expressed in the constitution and bylaws of this church and on the other hand allow for the freedom of colouring outside the lines. We need to hold these together in a healthy and creative tension as we continue to discern possibilities and try out new ministries across the church.

By naming Courageous Innovation as one of our strategic priorities, National Church Council is recognizing that God may indeed be calling us to new things and new ways and we may have to try things and fail and learn from our failures as part of our faithful discipleship.

Empowered Disciples

Now as in all times of the church there is a need to create and nurture faithful participation in **God's mission** in the world. In an effort to inspire a church that is prophetic, missional, and diaconal, the ELCIC's Faith, Order and Doctrine committee has published *Public Ministry in the ELCIC: A preliminary draft* for review, reflection and response by September 30, 2018.

At the same time, we are looking at new ways of calling and equipping Rostered leaders in our church for specific ministries.

We believe the new *Congregational Employment Agreements* and updated *Letters of Call* will enhance the quality of your vocational relationships and deepen the bonds of mutual care and accountability.

And, in this year of synod conventions, we also look forward to two national gatherings—the Canadian Lutheran Anglican Youth (CLAY) gathering (www.claygathering.ca) and the National Worship Conference (www.nationalworshipconference.org). Both of these Lutheran/Anglican events serve to strengthen faith and empower people in witness and service.

Thank you for your participation in the ELCIC Reformation Challenge. I was overwhelmed and proud by the contributions, large and small, that individuals, congregations and synods make to help us meet our goals. We may not have met all of our challenge goals but together we raised the equivalent of about four million dollars for ministry in Canada and around the world. How amazing is that!

In his 2018 New **Year's** message to the Lutheran World Federation, General Secretary Martin Junge declared that despite the many challenges we face, there is no better time than now to be the church. By acknowledging these challenges, it reminds us to stay focused on what has been given to us without cost, and share it with the thirsty in the world—offering a life-giving witness. "It is a good year to be the church. We have our hands filled with gifts to **share**," says Martin! And I agree.





Be Challenged:

Lutheran Theological Seminary, Saskatoon is in an exciting time, as we envision a new future. We are building around the invitation to "Be Challenged," encouraging potential ELCIC leaders to "Challenge Yourself. Challenge Others. Challenge the World."

New President:

We have called a new President, the Rev. Dr. William (Bill) Harrison. Dr. Harrison is an Anglican, coming most recently from the Diocese of Huron (Southwestern Ontario), where he served as Director for Mission and Ministry. In that role, he led the Diocese in strategic planning, facilitating church transformations (different formations, closures, new formations), and teaching about evangelism. Previously, he served as Director for Mission and Ministry, and as parish clergy in the Diocese of Kootenay (BC). From 2000 until 2005, he was Professor of Theology, in addition to filling the roles of Registrar and Vice-Principal, at the College of Emmanuel & St. Chad in Saskatoon; there, he co-taught with LTS faculty in a shared effort to combine Lutheran and Anglican formation, when possible.

Breadth of Ministry;

Today's complex world, in which the church has shrinking resources, demands that we take seriously the multiplicity of ministries and the need to work in teams. LTS continues its strong commitment to preparing ordained clergy for parish leadership (Master of Divinity) and continuing education for ordained leaders (Doctor of Ministry). At the same time, we are developing programmes to strengthen the work of people in other church leadership roles. The Lay Academy is becoming a significant part of the Seminary's work, offering programmes of interest to laypeople and developing training for Authorized Lay Ministers. LTS offers the Certificate in Diaconal Ministry and has recently provided the only course available in Canada on Diaconal Theology and Practice (required for Diaconal Ministry). In the Fall of 2018, we will enroll the first cohort in our Master in Health Care and Parish Nursing degree, an advanced degree meant to increase Christian theological reflection on the health care system and to strengthen the parish nursing system by responding to major issues in the field. We strive to prepare people for the whole breadth of ministry in today's ELCIC.

Flexible Delivery Curriculum:

Today's LTS looks very different from the seminary of days gone by. Nearly all of our students live at a distance from the Seminary. Our courses are offered in intensive formats (usually two weeks on campus, one week for courses during internship) and on-line. Students are formed in their home parishes and in internship parishes. They can continue with their families and existing support systems. The learning community is strong. It develops in new ways, especially through use of electronic media; community is sustained partly by its development in the ordinary walk of life and family, so that ties continue after time at LTS.

Challenge Scholarships:

We are very pleased to announce a new scholarship programme at LTS. For each of the next three years (2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21), we will offer up to a total of 5 scholarships per year for new students. A Master of Divinity degree student receiving a scholarship will be given a total of \$50,000 (\$20,000 for each of the first two years, while in classes, and \$5,000 for each of the internship years). A Master of Theological Studies degree student receiving a scholarship will be given a total of \$40,000 (\$20,000 for each of the two years of classes). Priority will be given to spreading the scholarships across the 4 Western Synods of the ELCIC. Share the news! Invite people to apply!

Recruitment:

Recruitment has become a significant issue in church life, as we all work together to encourage people to consider new roles in church leadership. The Seminary's strategy is multipronged: the Challenge Scholarship programme improves funding, while we reach out to people in parishes, schools, and elsewhere, using the language of "Challenge" as our theme of invitation. The Seminary invites people to "Be Challenged" with us, asking that potential leaders recognize that a call to church leadership of any kind will involve three aspects: "Challenge Yourself" (using and increasing all of your skills, and adding new ones), "Challenge Others" (as you help to lead a transforming church), and "Challenge the World" (in a church that is now counter-cultural, participating in God's work of changing society). We believe that today's people are up for a challenge, and are most excited by a life committed to growth and transformation.

We are reaching out with these themes to all parishes, postsecondary institutions, and secondary schools that are prepared to welcome us. We are striving to build (in some cases, re-build) ties to institutions that have prepared students for ELCIC leadership in the past, such as camp ministries and traditionally Lutheran colleges and high schools. We welcome invitations to parishes and church events where we can share the joy of life in church leadership and in the kind of formation that LTS offers.

Attendance:

For the 2017-18 academic year, we have 19 full-time students and 10 part-time students registered. We have 12 candidates for ordained ministry and 2 candidates for the diaconate. Six people are currently enrolled in the Doctor of Ministry programme, which is playing an expanded role in the Seminary's life. Rising interest in the D.Min. is very encouraging; it shows that parish clergy have a thirst for developing their skills at a challenging time in the church's life.

Finances and the Future:

The Seminary faces significant financial issues. After years of austerity measures that cannot be sustained over the longer term, we continue to have a structural deficit of over \$100,000 annually. The Board is considering a variety of options for moving forward in a way that will serve the synods and will best cater to the Seminary's revised needs in a world where our course delivery is in an intensive format or online, and where our numbers are relatively small.
